

Sale of 170,000,000 Feet

Another big timber deal was consummated Monday when Adelsperger and Conrad sold to E. J. Hubbard and John Kiernan of Portland, 170,000,000 feet of timber. The buyers are the owners of the Winchester Bay Lumber Company at Reedsport and a new logging road will be built to the timber and the tract logged to help supply the Reedsport mill, says a bay paper.

The timber is situated in township 22 south of range 12 west and is a part of the timber bought by the Adelsperger and Conrad from the Gardiner mill company. The sale is all of the timber held by Adelsperger and Conrad south of the Umpqua river and extending up to and adjoining the Buehner Lumber Company timber in the Tenmile country. The price was not given out but the deal is said to have involved something in the neighborhood of \$400,000.

With this sale all of the mills at Reedsport now hold timber of their own sufficient to keep them operating from five to fifteen years.

Coos County's Coal.

The Oregonian quotes Banker Loney, of Powers, as follows in relation to coal and iron veins in that section:

"Geologists who have made the examination assert that one of the finest beds of coal in the west is near Powers, Coos county, the town E. J. Loney registers from at the Imperial. There are three layers of coal within six miles of Powers, and the lowest strata is the best. Also, near by, there is said to be a mountain of iron ore, although there is more question about the ore than about the coal. Some enthusiasts predict that with the iron ore and the coal, Coos Bay will some day become a second Pittsburg, but that happy time is so far in the future that the average citizen doesn't expect to see it."

The State Bureau of Mines and Geology is on record as estimating that there are sixty million tons of coal in the Squaw Basin beyond Powers.

Whale on the Beach.

The body of a big whale came ashore about 400 yards south of the John R. Smith black sand beach mine Friday night.

The whale was a big specimen, about 75 feet long, and of the sperm variety. Mr. Smith and assistant visited the scene and obtained the whalebone from the animal's jaws amounting to several pounds in weight, and will investigate the carcass for ambergris.

The seagulls seemed to know that prosperity and plenty for them was at hand almost as soon as the carcass rolled onto the sands, for early Friday morning Mr. Smith's attention was attracted by the hundreds of gulls circling the vicinity.

He says that now there are at least ten thousand gulls feeding on the carcass in relays.—Bandon World.

Two Goals Reached.

A well attended meeting of the Dew Valley community was held April 2nd and the program of work for that community was gone over. At least two of the goals for 1920 have already been reached and will be far surpassed before January 1st 1921. There are 3 standard calf clubs organized in this community; but they have been having a great deal of trouble to secure calves. Two cars of molasses and one car of mill feed has been purchased. Some misunderstandings have arisen over feed pools; due to a lack of any definite system on the part of the farm bureau for handling such matters. Plans are under way by the farm bureau Executive committee which will provide for definite orders and earnest payments on order which will do away with a great deal of the present troubles with pools.

Mr. I. O. Peterson was elected as pest project leader to take the place of Kenneth Perkins who has moved from the community.

NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE GROUND SQUIRRELS

Every person, firm or partnership, company or corporation residing, owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, building, wharf or dock infested with digger ground squirrels in Coos County, Oregon is hereby notified to begin at once to effectively exterminate and destroy all such DIGGER GROUND SQUIRRELS.

The following poison for mixing and instructions for use thereof is the method most expedient and effective to be used for the extermination and destruction of such ground squirrels and is hereby recommended, to-wit: alkaloid strychnine used on either barley or wheat, barley preferred, mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit:

Barley, clean grain	16 quarts
Strychnine (powdered alkaloid)	1 ounce
Bicarbonate of soda (baking soda)	1 ounce
Thin starch paste	3-4 pint
Heavy corn syrup	1-4 pint
Glycerine	1 tablespoonful
Saccharin	1-10 ounce

This material should be mixed as follows: Mix thoroughly 1 ounce of powdered strychnine (alkaloid) and 1 ounce of common baking soda. Sift this into 3-4 pint of thin hot paste and stir to a smooth creamy mass. (The starch paste is made by dissolving 1 heaping tablespoonful of dry gloss starch in a little cold water, which is then added to 3-4 pint of boiling water. Boil and stir constantly until a clear thin paste is formed.) Add 1-4 pint heavy corn syrup and 1 tablespoonful of glycerine and stir thoroughly. Add 1-10 ounce of saccharin and stir thoroughly. Pour this mixture over 16 quarts of clean barley and mix well so that each grain is coated.

One quart of the poisoned grain mixed as aforesaid is sufficient for forty or fifty baits and this quantity scattered along squirrel trails or on clean hard places on the surface about the holes will not endanger stock. Strychnine in any form other than the powdered strychnine (alkaloid) is not effective in the above formula.

From the date hereof until May 1st is the most effective time to poison and destroy the digger squirrels, as they are just emerging from their hibernation. They are hungry and food is scarce.

The County Court of Coos County, Oregon, has secured a large amount of strychnine and the other ingredients necessary for the mixture, and a quantity thereof has been mixed and is now on sale to the farmers or persons interested at actual cost and may be had by applying to the undersigned at his office Coquille, Oregon or in Farm Bureau Centers thru the Pest Project leaders.

If any person herein designated shall, within thirty days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin in good faith to exterminate, eradicate and destroy, according to the method aforesaid, or by any other ef-

fective means said ground squirrels herein designated, the County Court of Coos County, Oregon, will appoint a person or persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of such ground squirrels, and the cost thereof incurred will be assessed to such land, building, wharf or dock, and unless paid will become a lien against the same, for the extermination of said ground squirrels.

This notice is published pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided and for two consecutive weeks or three issues, and all persons described therein are required to take notice thereof.
