BEATS THEM ALL

BEND WINS WASHINGTONIAN

Pioneer of Great Falls Sees Here Prospects That Far Surpass Those of the Montana City—Enthusiasms Over Irrigating.

A. T. Frame, a contractor and builder of Colville, Wash., is looking over the Bend country this week. His first impressions were favorable and the situation has "grown on him" daily since he arrived. It is probable that he will make permanent location here.

Mr. Frame was one of the first settlers at Great Falls, Mont. He says the conditions at Bend are almost identical with those at Great Falls 20 years ago, except that the Montana town had no tree or green thing to cheer it. The water power was there, but no timber and not half the farming prospects. It was truly a desert country, sandy, rocky, tough, dry, cold. But now Great Falls is a thrifty city of 30,000 population.

"I never saw such an irrigating proposition as this," said Mr. Frame. "It is almost ideal. Montana has nothing to compare with it, the Yakima valley is not nearly so promising in my estimation, and I am fresh from examination of Idaho enterprises that I turn down without hesitation. But this Deshutes country holds me; it beats them all, in my judgment. And particularly Bend. The beauty of its location and surroundings, the

water for power and irrigation, the timber, the climate—all these impress me greatly and I cannot see why a great city will not grow here. It has the basis and, so far as I have observed, the spirit of progress."

Several months have been spent by Mr. Frame in looking about the country with a view to changing his home from Northeastern Washington. He traveled through Western Oregon and his wife joined him in Coos county. But he sent her home and went over into Idaho to reconnoiter. She also went there and then returned home the second time. She now assures him that she will not go back again, that the third time they must drive stakes and establish home. And he is about ready to tell her to come on to Bend.

BULLETIN MOVES NEXT WEEK
