# **VAST POWER** DEVELOPMENT **FOLEY'S PLAN**

Seeks Opportunity to Show Merits in Hearing

\$8,000,000.00 TO BE COST

Plant Proposed at Metolius Site Means Tremendous Industrial Growth and Solution of North Unit Problem

Plans of the Bend Water, Light & Power Co. for the construction of a mammoth power plant, the largest in the northwest, at a cost of \$8,000.

BURDICK, EZELL, horsepower below the junction of the Deschutes, Metolius, and Crooked rivers, were made known Wednesday by H. T. Foley, general manager of the company. Foley appeared before Bend Commercial club directors and asked and received their support for Returns Nearly Complete his request that the matter of granting temporary a permit for power development, already authorized by the federal power commission, be reopened in order that a hearing can be given on the merits of the plan which Foley proposes. The Redmond Com- R. mercial club and the North unit have county were leading in the race for already backed Foley by asking the three seats in the state house reopening of the case, and further support from Portland and state organizations will be solicited.

Great Possibilities Seen

The project which the Bend Water. Light & Power Co. manager unfolded today is one which offers possibilities, not only for vast industrial development, but also gives a solution for the reclamation problems of the Jefferson Water Conservancy district, formerly known as the North 1,279, Bradbury 1,080 and Gard unit. Sufficient power would be de- 1,280 veloped for the operation of pumps larger than any ever heretofore designed, to lift water from the Deschutes and deliver it at the edge of the North unit at a less cost than would be involved by use of a gravity system. Approximately 95,00 horsepower would be used for this purpose for four months of the year, and for the remaining eight months the full output of power would be available for manufacturing, with 25,000 horsepower available for such use even during the irrigation season.

# COMPLAINT OF COREY OPPOSED BY LOCAL CLUB

Move to Force Cutoff Construction Protested

P. S. & E. MAY BUILD

End of Stock Litigation, Now in Sight, Opens Way for Construction of Mount Angel-Bend Line, Says H. L. Huson

That the railroad committee of the Bend Commercial club will protest against the complaint of State Public Service Commissioner H. H. Corey, which seeks to force the construction. of the Natron cutoff, was the statement Saturday of F. Dement, chairman of the committee. The complaint, Dement points out, has failed to recognize Central Oregon's railroad needs. A letter is shortly to be drafted, formally placing the committee's protest on record.

Although made public just after the visit of H. L. Huson, vice president and chief engineer for the Portland & Southeastern, the action taken by the committee had been contemplated for some time, Dement said.

Plans of the Portland & Southeastern railway now await only the decision of the United States supreme court on the stock division case, which should be due in the very near future, Huson says. As a matter of fact, had not this litigation been started, the railroad, surveys for which were made in 1919 between Mt. Angel and Sisters, would now be an accomplished fact, he states,
