

## MOTOR SERVICE ASSETS VANISH

### Creditors Slow in Filing Claims—Trustee Yet to Be Named

Scheduled assets of the Bend Motor Service Co., bankrupt, total \$8,000, but apparently a large proportion of these have vanished into thin air, it was learned at the creditors' meeting at the office of G. C. Morgan, referee, Monday. A considerable part of these disappeared in the creditors' raid on the establishment in early fall which resulted in the virtual suspension of business. Since that time, also, says Morgan, assets have steadily disappeared.

Of claims scheduled at more than \$12,000, only \$2,000 have been filed. A trustee will be appointed later. Creditors of the Owl pharmacy will meet next Monday.

### DUCKS VISIT BEND WITH COLD WEATHER

#### Large Numbers of Waterfowl, Protected When in City Limits, Frequent Deschutes River

Cold weather is again bringing the Deschutes to the attention of waterfowl, and many wild ducks are making the river within the city limits their headquarters. Half a hundred at a time were frequently seen last week. A dozen or more canvasbacks have been here.

Wildfowl coming within the city limits are protected by law.

### HEALTH ASSOCIATION ACTIVE IN COUNTY

#### Seal Sale Organized in Redmond—Over \$400 Worth Sold Here—1,151 Pupils Examined

Organization of the Christmas seal sale in Redmond by the Deschutes County Health association was effected last week. Mrs. Gladys Conant being appointed chairman. Over \$400 worth of seals have been sold in Bend, but none of the outside communities in the county have yet reported, announces Mrs. Ralph Spencer, county chairman.

Plans for the inspection of the Redmond schools were made by Miss Grace MacDowell, county nurse, on the visit at which the seal sale was organized. The association's report for November shows that 1,151 pupils were examined as to health, 43 cases of disease are under the nurse's attention, and 87 homes were visited.

One tuberculosis patient was returned to California, saving this county the expense of caring for her; one delinquent minor was placed in the Salvation Army home in Portland, and two crippled children were taken to the state home.
