

## FIX SCHEDULE FOR QUINTETS

### Boys' and Girls' Teams to Play Same Evening, Is Officials' Plan

Boys' and girls' basketball teams of the high schools in Central Oregon conference will play on the same evenings this year, the girls' games being played first, it was decided at Saturday's meeting of school officials, held in connection with the meeting of the schoolmaster's association.

Another innovation this year will be the use of local officials in each town, instead of the visiting team bringing the referee. This will rob home town fans of their accustomed diversion of "ragging" the visiting official, and will also reduce expenses, the school men explain.

Pennants will be given for the championship in both boys' and girls' basketball, the title to be determined on a percentage basis.

The schoolmasters will hold their next meeting at Prineville, on the second Saturday in February, the program to be arranged by Superintendent J. E. Myers, Principal A. F. Isensee of Prineville and Principal George Gabriel of Madras. At that time also plans will be outlined for the Central Oregon school day to be held in the spring.

The basketball schedule as adopted Saturday follows:

- January 26—Bend at Prineville, Redmond at Madras.
- February 2—Madras at Bend, Prineville at Redmond.
- February 9—Redmond at Bend, Prineville at Madras.
- February 16—Bend at Madras, Redmond at Prineville.
- February 23—Prineville at Bend, Madras at Redmond.
- March 2—Bend at Redmond, Madras at Prineville.

## SUPREME OFFICERS OF LODGE COMING

## TERRY TO GIVE TAYLOR BATTLE

### New Orleans Bantam Brings Good Record and Looks Good to Fans

Judging from the record of Jerry Terry, who will fight Allie Taylor in the main event of next Monday's smoker at the American Legion building, Taylor will have to put up one of the best fights of his career to keep from interrupting his own long string of victories in the ring.

Terry hails from New Orleans, and among the men he has met are numbered Frankie Brown of New York, who has fought Kilbane twice, getting a draw once; Knockout Eggers of New York, Young Barrere, Kid Mattiango and Jack Russo of New Orleans. He knocked out Mike Russo in the first round, and won in four rounds from Eddie O'Hara of New Orleans. He fought a draw with Pascal Colletti of New Orleans and another with Sammy Sandow of Cincinnati. He lost decisions to Memphis Pal Moore and Roy Moore of St. Paul.

His last fight was in Portland, when he knocked out Billy Malah in the second round. Terry has been training here for some time, and fans who have seen him work are of the opinion that he will make Taylor extend himself.

The growing interest in the boxing game here is being evidenced in large attendance at the training sessions at the legion building. All of the men on the Christmas card who are in the city worked out Sunday afternoon before a large crowd.

## EXTEND WELCOME TO DOGS

### Animals Admitted Anywhere on the Continent of Europe, if Proper Payment is Made.

In Venice a dog can go anywhere with his master, even to the hotel table, where, if he is paid for at the same rate as his master, he may take his food. If he accompanies the boss on one of the noisy steamers that destroy the poetry of the Grand canal he must be paid for exactly as if he were a human being.

All over the continent of Europe the rights of people with dogs are recognized—at a price. One can take a dog into any compartment of a train, including the wagon-lit, but first it is necessary to buy a third-class ticket for him. In Italy he travels a little more cheaply. There, when one is getting his baggage weighed (and paying for the billet) one buys another for the dog, which costs one-half of third-class rate. Provided with this ticket the dog is admitted to wherever his master goes.

### Fish's "Smoke Screen."

The aristous, a deep-sea prawn, has a method of lighting that gives the appearance of a multitude of smoke rings. When excited by the nearness of an enemy the prawn ejects respiratory water in tiny squirts and into this stream the luciferin is forced from countless glands opening into the stream by fine ducts. As the chemicals combine, puffy clouds of luminous particles float in the sea. This is the "smoke screen" provided by nature. The species of luminous fish, called "photoblephron," has a dimmer system in an inside chamber and burns continuously. When the fish wishes to shut off the light, he causes a black pigmented curtain to slide down over the light cell opening like an eyelid. The light organ preserves its luminescence even when removed and is used by fishermen of the islands of Banda, about 800 miles southeast of the Philippines, as bait for night fishing.

### Omens Seen in Lightning.

In a book published in England in 1902 it said that "the Thracians when it thunders take their bows and arrows and shoot up to the clouds against the thunder, imagining by their shooting to drive the thunders away. Cabrias, the general of Athens, being ready to strike a battle at sea, it suddenly lightened, which so frightened the soldiers that they were unwilling to fight, until Cabrias said: 'Now is the time to fight, when Jupiter himself, with his lightning, doth show that he is ready to go before us.' So Epaminondas, at his going to battle, it suddenly lightened that it so amazed his soldiers, when Epaminondas comforted them and said: 'Lumen hoc numifixa ostendunt'—'By these lightnings the gods show us that we shall have victories.'"

### Various Burial Customs.

The practice of carrying a corpse out feet first may be derived from the idea that if he were living, he would leave the house feet first. A coffin of a layman if taken into a church is placed in the middle of the nave, the feet to the East or sanctuary, but if the body be that of a cleric, the head is put to the sanctuary.

It is the practice in Great Britain to place the bodies of soldiers in their coffins with their feet going in the direction that the calisson is to travel.

In countries where shoes are worn, the deceased is shod, for he has a long journey to take. This, therefore, points to a reason for carrying out the dead feet first—they are traveling on their last journey.—Literary Digest.
