We have learned that the Beaverton Grange has appointed a \$550 per acre, terms to suit, 6 committee to solicit and prepare an exhibit for the county fair, and the grange expects to have a larger and better display of agricultural products than it had last year at the county fair at Forest Grove, and you are all familiar with its prize winning success then. The idea at first was to hold the local fair just 47-acre tract, 7 room house, large ahead of the county fair and secure the grange exhibit for our atreet enterprise. In that case our fair cannot be postponed to a later date than the first days of October.
