There are immense tracts of the finest timber, which have never been touched, on the Coquille river and its tributar es, and if the cost of transportating the logs to the buy can be brought down to a figure which will permit it, there is no doubt that nearly all this timber will be converted into lumber in the mills here, where shipping facilities are adequate

This will help both the bay and the river and tend to bring the two parts of the country into closer relations, a thing much to be desired.
