

LABOR FEDERATION In Session At New Orleans

**GOMPERS INVESTIGATION
WILL GO FORWARD**
Long Debate on Question of Pensions for Worth-out Working People

New Orleans, Nov. 18.—Contrary to expectations the Gompers investigation was not taken up when the Federation of Labor opened its convention this morning. The chair announced that the fifth member of the committee, who will be umpire, had not yet been decided on.

Both Gompers, and Shaffer, announced that they courted investigation.

It will be referred to a special committee of five: two to be selected by Gompers' two by Shaffer, and the four choosing a fifth. Mr. Shaffer named J. M. Slayton, of the Carpenters and Joiners, W. H. Haskens, of the United Mine Workers of Ohio. President Gompers named John A. Moffatt, United Pattern makers, Edgar A. Agard, Glass Bottle blowers.

Debate was interrupted to allow the introduction of the foreign delegates who made brief addresses.

The morning session was largely devoted to debate of a socialistic resolution offered by Delegate Berger of Milwaukee, which urged that effort be made to secure National legislation to provide pensions for aged working people.

The tower of the Mormon temple of St. George oscillated 10 inches. Every ceiling in the new school house fell. The panic was so great that the teachers used physical force to prevent the children being trampled to death.

Thousands of Mormons fell down in the streets and prayed for their lives.
