**C. C. CHAPMAN SPEAKS.**

A goodly number of our citizens, including quite a few of the farmers from the surrounding country, listened to an interesting talk Wednesday evening at the I. O. O. F. hall by C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Portland Commercial Club. Mr. Chapman arrived in Heppner from Hermiston by auto in charge of A. M. Phelps and W. W. Smead, who brought him over by the way of the banana belt and lone so that he could get some idea of the "bigness" of Morrow county, and also be prepared to do some real live boosting for our section. The trip had been planned for some time and would have been made earlier had it been possible for Mr. Chapman to get away from his duties at Portland. He was exceedingly well pleased with the trip across the country and formed a good idea of what is required here to build us up, and the information acquired at first hand will be used to a good advantage in the promotion of settlements in this section.

Mr. Chapman devoted the most of his address last night to a presentation of the aim, objects and work of the body with which he is connected at Portland. He fully explained that it is the work of the Portland Commercial Club to build up Oregon, and having this end in view their organization is standing back of the work of the O. A. C. in the promotion of better agricultural conditions all over the state; they rightly believe that the building up of rural Oregon means more substantial development of the metropolis which is so situated that when the farmer and agriculturist makes a dollar, Portland gets a goodly share of it. So the work of development is being carried along and backed up by Portland business men in a practical and substantial way, and the state at large is being greatly benefited. Better methods of farming, agriculture and horticulture are being promoted; diversified farming is receiving a boost, and it is being demonstrated that more intensified farming is a better paying proposition.

The raising of \$150,000 to take care of the work of the Club for the next three years is going along nicely, and this will soon be provided. As Mr. Chapman well states, nothing of consequence can be done without money, and this the business men of Portland are providing liberally.

Preceding Mr. Chapman's talk, a committee was appointed to do some soliciting of funds in behalf of the Heppner Booster Club, and the enthusiastic remarks of the speaker put some

new life into that organization at this place. Chapman is a live wire.

The law sometimes makes queer blunders. One day last month two men were put on trial in a New York City court, charged with having committed an assault with a club upon a tailor who refused to go on strike with his fellows. When the case was called, the prosecuting officer moved the discharge of one of the two prisoners on the ground that there was no evidence against him. As soon as he was discharged, he was placed on the stand, and testified that the other prisoner could not have committed the assault, because he himself had committed it. The other man accordingly went free, and the constitution of the United States does not permit a second prosecution of the one who confessed that he was guilty.—The Youth's Companion.
