Great Mistake With Pigs.
One of the greatest mistakes made by the fall pig grower is that of not providing a warm, dry, easily accessible feeding place for the pigs that are counted upon to roll in the prospective dollars of profit.

Ration for Sows and Pigs.
Crushed or ground oats as a slop may form one-third of the ration for brood sows and for young pigs until they reach the period of fattening; but oats are not profitable as a feed for fattening hogs.

The best investment on a farm where cows are milked is a silo and no farmer or dairyman need hesitate to build a silo. It will make money for him every year and the cost of the silo is easily absorbed in an increased flow of milk and better-looking cows.

A profitable cow should produce 5,000 pounds of milk or 200 pounds of butterfat in 300 days. Are your cows all profitable? Why not find out? Is milking dairy cows a business proposition with you? If so, why not apply business methods?

It never pays to crowd, especially on the roosts. A little unoccupied space is better than to have the perches so crowded that the fowls have to try to sleep on top of one another.

The fowls should be kept in good healthy condition at all times. A dose of epsom salts, one pound to 100 birds is a good conditioner. Permanent of potash added to the drinking water is also good to prevent colds and roup.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Salem.—With more than 8000 signatures, the nominating petition of President Coolidge was filed Saturday with Secretary of State Koser by Senator Patterson, Oregon campaign manager for the president.

St. Helens.—Lumber shipments, while light, showed a slight increase over the last week. Three shipments were made by water and totaled 3,200,000 feet. One shipment was for foreign ports and the others for California.

Salem.—The planting of trees and other shrubbery along the highways in Oregon will be encouraged by the state highway commission, according to an announcement made here by Roy Klein, in charge of the local offices of the department.

Grants Pass.—Water has been turned into the south canal of the Grants Pass irrigation district. Although farmers do not need the water yet for irrigation, it has been placed in the ditches so that it will be on hand should a sudden dry period develop.

Eugene.—The bounty on 19 seals recently killed in the Pacific ocean by Herman Larsen, a rancher in western Lane county, was collected at the office of the county clerk here Saturday. He received \$47.50 for bringing in the pelts of the sea animals. It is seldom that the bounty is collected here on these animals.

Portland.—Robert E. Strahorn of Spokane, president of the Oregon, California & Eastern railroad, arrived in Portland Saturday to spend \$100,000 this week for equipment for his railroad, which plans to devote the coming summer to general improvement of the lines between Sprague River and Klamath Falls.

Haines.—W. H. Mayes, local dairyman, has brought a carload of registered and high-grade Jersey cattle here from Tillamook county. Milk cows in the shipment were accompanied by an attendant and fed and milked en route. Mr. Mayes now owns about 60 head of Jersey milk stock on his ranch just west of Haines.

Bend.—A heavy surplus of hay in central Oregon not needed during the winter because of the unusually mild weather will mean an agricultural development in this section tending to greater diversification, farmers believe. It is estimated that 400 carloads of alfalfa remain in stack in Deschutes county alone.

Salem.—A total of 21,578 cash bonuses authorized by the world war veterans' state aid commission had been paid up to March 31, according to a report prepared here Saturday by Major Simpson, acting secretary for the department. Cash payments aggregated \$4,685,071.95. Of this amount approximately \$3,400,000 was paid to ex-service men living in Oregon.

Marshfield.—Coos county electors will be asked to vote for good roads bonds for \$375,000 at the primary election, according to an order by the county court Friday. Of this amount \$70,000 will be used for matching state and other money on the Hauser-Glasgow hard surfacing, \$70,000 for the Coquille-Handon hard surfacing, and \$50,000 on the Myrtle Point-Roseburg highway.

Shaniko.—Remarkable progress is being made on the construction of the last link of the Sherman highway in Wasco county. This section extends from a point about eight miles north of Shaniko to an intersection with the Dallas-California highway near the head of Cow canyon, a distance of about 20 miles. The highway runs through Shaniko, which is the terminus of the old Columbia Southern railway, now a branch line of the O-W. H. & N.

Pendleton.—After carrying a safe weighing 400 pounds about 100 feet up the Oregon-Washington highway from the Marvin Roy garage in Pilot Rock, yeggs Saturday knocked off the combination and attempted to blow it open, according to T. B. Buffington, deputy sheriff, who investigated the case. The sound of the explosion awakened citizens. The car in which the yeggs fled came toward Pendleton, but trace of the car was lost a short distance outside of Pilot Rock.

Salem.—Approximately \$600,000 collected through the administration of the state income tax law has been turned over to the state treasurer, according to Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner, under whose direction the department is being conducted. Out of approximately \$8,000 returns sent out by the department, more than 80,000 have been received from persons and corporations affected by the act. When the larger part of the outstanding returns are received prior to April 15, the last day for filing, the tax commissioner predicted that he will have turned over to the treasury department between \$700,000 and \$800,000.

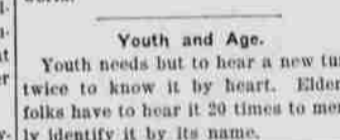
