

Mustang golf continues to dominate green

Team hosts Mustang Invitational this Friday

The Heppner Mustang golf program has been busy the last couple of weeks with matches, and they have done very well. The Heppner girls' team stayed undefeated on the season by winning tournaments in La Grande and John Day. The boys' team also won the team title at the John Day tournament and finished third at the always tough Westside Christian tournament held at the Pumpkin Ridge Golf course in Hillsboro.

The Mustang girls' team shot a 393 at La Grande to take the team title. Sophie Grant finished second overall and led the team with a score of 90. Nicole Propheter was next with a 96 while Amanda Rea shot a 101 on the day. Madison Combe recorded a 106, Claire Grieb shot a 107 and Caitlyn Scrivner had a 109. Susie Cason also traveled and golfed for the Mustangs.

The girls' team also won the Grant Union Invitational in John Day by shooting 426 as a team. The weather was not the best for a golf tournament, as it hailed several times and the

players had to clear off the greens so they could putt. Propheter shot an even 100 while Rea followed closely with a 103. Scrivner was next with a 108 and Grieb rounded out the team score with a 115. First-year golfer Cason gained valuable experience playing in the extreme conditions. Heppner golfer Sophie Grant pulled a muscle in the middle of her round and was not able to finish.

The boys' team also fought through the tough weather to win the team title in John Day. They finished the day with an outstanding team score of

337. Logan Grieb was the first-place medalist for the tournament, shooting a 79. Dan Bretsch finished second with an outstanding round of 81. Logan Burright stepped up and fired a season best 88 for the Mustangs and freshman Kellen Grant followed with an 89. Other Heppner golfers who went and played were Jake Lindsay, Cason Mitchell, Reno Ferguson, Charles Cason, Casey Fletcher and Wyatt McNary.

Several Mustang golfers traveled to Hillsboro to play the Pumpkin Ridge course. The team finished

third at the invitational tournament that features some of the top individuals and teams from the west side of the state. Many of the top placers at the state golf tournament play in this event. The entire course was very wet and many places were so wet that they were unable to mow them. This meant that the rough was very tall and unforgiving. It was a struggle for all that played, but it was a great experience for the team to golf there.

The Mustangs finished in third place with a team score of 369. That was only seven strokes out of the first-place score of 362 shot by Portland Adventist. Logan Grieb finished in fifth place overall by shooting an 83. Kellen Grant was next with an 89 and Bretsch shot a 94. Lindsay rounded out the team score with a 102.

This Friday the team will host several visiting schools at the Mustang Invitational. The tournament will be held at Willow Creek Country Club and the action begins at 10 a.m. Mustang golf supporters are encouraged to come cheer on the team.

-Continued from PAGE ONE has a documented history of a medical condition that creates a barrier to achievement, 24 credits: 3-English, 2-math, 2-science, 2-social studies, 1-health, 1-PE, 1 career technical ed, the arts or world language, 1-career ed, 11-electives.

The board also heard a presentation from Kim Putman and Katrina Bretsch concerning UNICEF and the nutrition education program.

Also at the meeting, Superintendent Dirk Dirksen informed the board that the workforce center and the early childhood education center, which will include Umatilla/Morrow Head Start, are scheduled to be opened near the SAGE Center in Boardman later this summer, joining the Boardman Rec Center, which is looking at a July 1 debut. Dirksen said that the move will free up district space for projected growth at Sam Boardman Elementary School.

In other business, the board:

-learned from Dirksen that summer school will be held in Heppner and Irrigon in June and in Boardman in August.

-learned from Dirksen that the proposed state school budget is projected to be in the neighborhood of \$8.2 billion.

Lindsay Named To Commission

Larry Lindsay of Lexington has been appointed to the Morrow County Port Commission, succeeding the late Harvey Malcom. It was announced this week.

Lindsay, a teacher, is a life-long resident of the county. He is president of the Morrow county Livestock Growers and is a director and secretary of the Morrow County Grain Growers.

Nobody was regarded with more respect and admiration than Harvey Malcom. Lindsay said Monday, "No one can fill his shoes, but I will do my best to follow in his footsteps."

The new commissioner said that he is interested in orderly development of the county. He is well acquainted with the north end of the county since the Lindsay Ranches have extensive holdings in the range lands of that part of the county.

Lindsay graduated from the University of Portland in business administration and attended Georgetown Law Center in Washington, D. C. for a year. He served as a lieutenant in the Air Force as an accounting and finance officer for a year in 1967-68.

He will serve on this appointment until the end of 1968 but may seek reelection to the position for an ensuing term.

Current chairman of the commission is Dewey West of Boardman. Other members are Dick Krebs of Cecil, Garland Swanson of Lone and Oscar Peterson of Lone.

Malcom was elected to the commission in November, 1966, after winning both Republican and Democratic nominations in the primaries. He served from the first of January until his death February 28.

The commission named Lindsay to succeed Malcom at its meeting last Thursday.
