Word was received Wednesday of the death in Lodi, Calif., of Dan W. Metzger, brother of John H. Metzger of Gresham, who was for many years a resident of Gresham. He was 73 years of age. Mr. Metzger, who was a native of Illinois, came to Oregon in 1874 and settled in Gresham soon after. He married Miss Emma Beers October 12, 1880, in Gresham, and they made their home here until eight or nine years ago, when they moved to California, where their only daughter had made her home.

Mr. and Mrs. Metzger were active in the grange and other organizations during their residence here. Both were friendly, whole hearted people who made warm friendships.

Mr. Metzger is survived by his widow of Lodi, one daughter, Mrs. E. S. Toppelman and a little granddaughter of Isleton, Calif., and a large number of relatives in this vicinity.
