The Oregonian's Stand for Joseph And the Broadside of a Critic

THE OREGONIAN'S STAND... The Oregonian ends speculation as to what its attitude will be regarding the Republican candidate for governor.

This is reminiscent of the old adage, "A dog, a woman, a chestnut tree, the more you beat 'em the better they be." The sulking body of journalism having failed to fizzle, is going to be good, on the count of many who and plourette like a modern grandma to her master's jazz.

In one way, this might seem the worst blow Joseph's candidacy has received. He has for weeks been assuring the people by airplane that the Oregonian was not for the man who had the power, but for the man who had the power obedient to the "special privilege seeking crowd," that it always "hovered around the fish-pots and still has its pierce and extended hand searching for manna," and now to show that "age has not withered nor custom staled her infinite variety," nor the primary paled her shining hand, the Oregonian is supporting Joseph.

And Mr. Joseph is not content with his own strides against the Oregonian, but had his henchman, Rufus Holman supplement the attack by radio and pamphlets which he broadcasted to every voter.

Said Mr. Holman: "Possibly there has been a time when the Oregonian was a righteous cause, but if I do not know when it was if it was uniformly against the common people, why should they follow it now? What has it ever done to deserve the confidence of the people that its advice or recommendation should be followed politically by any citizen interested only in the common good of all? It is a safe rule for the average citizen to vote AGAINST the men and measures advanced by the Oregonian and to vote FOR the men and measures which it most shamelessly misrepresents in its opposition."

If Mr. Joseph's advice was good before election it is equally good now, in fact, it is better.

What assurance however, have we that Mr. Joseph is not the secret candidate of the power trust, but forth on an impractical and unresizable platform of public ownership ballyhoo to confuse the public and destroy state regulation, and thus restore to the utilities their old practice of local and community barter and corruption?

It will be remembered that eight years ago when the outcry against higher phone and street car rates was at its height, they brought in the Ku Klux Klan with one of their employees in command, raised the religious issue, selected a telephone magnate for governor and in the ensuing hysteria people forgot all about utilities, and the utilities got the other fellow's religion—and the utilities got what they wanted.

Similarly in the Portland campaign against the utilities, Mr. Joseph, who besides being attorney for the department stores, the chain grocery stores and the chain banks, is also attorney for the Portland Telegram, owned by Herbert Fleischacker, multimillionaire power magnate, boasted that he brought Carey and Harlan to Portland with the net result that a ten cent street car fare became an actuality. The utilities got what they wanted under Mr. Joseph's leadership and the people paid for it.

Speaking of the pending disbarment proceedings against Mr. Joseph, the Oregonian says: "Whether the findings of the court are disciplinary or not, on Mr. Joseph as a member of the bar, this newspaper holds the opinion that the disbarment proceedings, in so far as they bear upon his eligibility for the office of governor may properly be looked upon as a closed incident. The Oregonian will support the Republican candidate for governor."

In other words, disbarment for unethical conduct from practice at the bar, constitutes eligibility for the governorship in the Oregonian's viewpoint—that is as long as he is the choice of 18 percent of the party voters? Shades of Harvey Scott—how the Oregonian has degenerated in the decadence of its senility!

NOT BOLDING... The Oregonian has become conscious that there is speculation as to what its attitude will be regarding the republican candidate for governor.

This newspaper has never doubted that Mr. Joseph would be honest, courageous and resourceful in conducting the office of governor of Oregon. Its opposition to him in the past was upon the ground that another possessing these same essential qualifications was also more nearly in accord with the Oregonian in its convictions on certain economic problems. The problems to which we refer can only be settled by vote of the people. We shall meet them when they arise. But even as to these we are not now throwing down the gauntlet of future battle. We here, for example, declare our opposition to the approval of any prospective and pending bills, which are development of unused natural resources. Differences of opinion which may possibly exist between Mr. Joseph and ourselves over issues as yet not fully uncovered—about which we shall have something to say when the time comes to say it—are not good reasons for combating his candidacy in the face of his success in the primary election.

For the thoughtful consideration of those Republicans who are expressing discontent over the result of the election, there is here offered the observation that the primary system is the only system available to a major political party for determining the party choice. In the absence of a second run-off or a preferential voting system or other device for determining the will of the party majority, we are left time again with only a plurality expression to guide us. Inasmuch as the direct primary is the only way we have of nominating party candidates and one which we have had sufficient opportunity to improve, yet we have not improved, it seems to us that the only justifications for bolting the nominee of the primary by candidates, voters, or newspapers are: (1) deficiency in some material attribute of his character; (2) the nomination of another, of a character superior to the present incumbent. There is still pending before the supreme court the recommendations of the referees in the disbarment proceedings. The Oregonian can discuss that phase of the situation only in a general way, and that which will now only say that whatever the findings of the court be disciplinary or not, on Mr. Joseph as a member of the bar, this newspaper holds the opinion that the disbarment proceedings, in so far as they bear upon his eligibility for the office of governor may properly be looked upon as a closed incident.
