**HINTS FOR PRUNE GROWERS**

Dehorning, which is so often practiced on old prune trees, is seldom needed except when the tree is in a badly vitatized condition and under most circumstances does harm.—W. S. Brown.

On prune fertilizers: On working out the plan of orchard fertilization, do not overlook the possibilities of the use of cover crops. They are one of the cheapest forms to obtain fibre for the soil and at the same time furnish the plant food. Another point is, do not expect fertilizers to take the place of pruning, spraying and good tillage.—C. I. Lewis.

Last Sunday evening Rev. Snyder, of the law enforcement department of the Anti-Saloon League, spoke at the Methodist church, it being a union service, the Congregationalists uniting. The speaker said the big job of dealing with the liquor people was just beginning, enforcement was difficult and slow for want of funds to enable the department to bring the violators to trial. However, he reported an aggressive fight was being put up and would be continued as long as there was need. He said if the measure now before the legislature became a law, fifty per cent of the fines collected would be turned over to the enforcement department and then it would be easier to enforce the law against bootlegging.
