PORTLAND RETAILERS ASK TOO BIG PROFIT

Results obtained by the Apple Growers Association in its recent campaign to sell extra fancy and fancy stocks of Newtown apples, usually exported to England, in Portland, have been discouraging. The officials of the Association are prone to lay the blame of poor sales to the failure on the part of retailers to push the local product.

"W. H. Dyer, of the Dyer, Bolland & Co.," says Wilmer Sieg, "is quoted as having said recently that Portland demands the best of all products. However, they are failing to get the best quality of apples because of efforts on the part of retailers to secure a profit greater than sales of extra fancy and fancy will bear. We have recently noticed signs in grocers' windows with the inscription, 'Why pay \$2 per box for apples when you can get them just as good for \$1.75.' As a matter of fact, the cheaper fruit is not of the grade offered for \$2, and the retailer is making a greater profit on it."

Mr. Sieg says that the Association is watching with keenest interest the outcome of the export trade. The shipping concerns and carriers and mechanics en route to eastern seaboard. He declares, however, that with shipping space growing scarcer every day, it may not be possible to reach England with the fruit. The general apple market is characterized as being on the down grade.

"The excess of barrel stock kept in storage," says Mr. Sieg, "will undoubtedly cause the market to end disastrously on a commission basis."

"GRANDPA" WILLIAM ELLIS IS DEAD

William Ellis, "Grandpa," as he was known to his friends and acquaintances, the oldest member of the local Masonic lodge and one of the oldest Masons of the state, passed away Sunday night at the Cottage hospital, where he has been confined the past several months, suffering from an attack of bronchial trouble.

Grandpa Ellis, a native of England, was 87 years of age. He had been a Mason for close to 50 years, having been initiated at Arcadia, Wis., where he resided before coming to Hood River 25 years ago.

Grandpa Ellis came to America with his family when he was but two years old. The family first settled in New York in 1837, then moved to Illinois, settling in McHenry county. In 1851 Mr. Ellis was married to Amanda Heath. Mrs. Ellis passed away in 1908. The family removed from Illinois to Wisconsin in 1854.

Funeral services were conducted on Tuesday afternoon at the Masonic lodge hall. Mr. Ellis had been a member of the local lodge for 21 years. Rev. J. L. Herschner officiated. Interment followed at Idlewild cemetery.

"Grandpa Ellis is survived by the following eight children: Ralph Ellis, of Molalla; Frank Ellis of Portland; William Ellis, Jr., of Chicago; Mrs. A. D. Robinson of Redfield, S. D.; Robert Ellis of Hudson, Wis.; Mrs. Frank Jones, of Vina, Calif.; and Mrs. Burns Jones and Mrs. Adeline Bangle, of this city. Twenty-four grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild survive.

The funeral was directed by the Anderson Undertaking Co.

COUNTY COURT APPOINTS OFFICERS

At a meeting of the county court last week the following appointments of county officers were made: Prof. L. B. Gibson, county school superintendent; C. M. Hurlburt, county surveyor; and L. Carter, E. W. Sweeney and Mrs. W. W. Rodwell, members of the county library board.

Prof. Gibson succeeds Prof. C. D. Thompson, resigned, who is now county agriculturist of Josephine county. Mr. Hurlburt, an Oak Grove rancher who was formerly a civil engineer of Portland and who had extensive experience in road building in Alaska and sections of the northwest, succeeds Murray Kay, who is now employed by the S. P. & S. R. Co.

Prof. Gibson has tendered his resignation as principal of the high school. The board, however, has not acted on the resignation, but it is stated that Prof. Gibson will be advised of some of his work. At the present time it would be difficult to dispense with his services altogether.

The county court also received the 27 deeds to right of way of the Columbia river highway, and the same were turned over to County Clerk Shoemaker for recording. This action on the part of the court is taken as an acceptance of the burden of maintenance of the highway.
