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Fire Engine Shows Injury. A test of the city's new \$13,000 motor-driven fire engine has developed that three of the cylinders of the 120-horsepower engine are cracked. The parts will be replaced at once. The cylinders, it is thought, were cracked after the engine was received in Portland from the factory.

Negro Bound Over. Kesar Bryant, 50-year old negro was on Saturday brought by Sheriff Johnson and Deputy Glenn Sloat from Wyeth, where he was arrested on a charge of burglarizing stacks of woodcutters. The negro, bound over to the grand jury, is alleged to have stolen clothing and money of the woodcutters.

Apple Market Looking Up. The Apple Growers Association, retaining practically all of the stored apples remaining here, reports that the market is making steady gains. The stored apples will be sold, it is said, at considerably better figures than were anticipated previous to the holidays. The Association reports its present storage stocks at approximately 200 cars. The greater percentage of the apples, however, have already been sold and are being held for buyers.

Call for Liberty Bond Transfers. All holders of Liberty bonds, the coupons of which have been exhausted, are asked to turn them in at once and receive new ones complete with all coupons. Holders have been requested by the government to turn the bonds in to their banks during February if possible.

H. R. Market Completes Improvements

The Hood River Market, owned by A. F. Davenport, has been greatly improved in the past several weeks. Mr. Davenport has completed the installation of a Harris refrigerating plant. The equipment is the most modern the market affords. Two cold rooms have been provided, one on the main floor, opening into the market, and the other in the basement, where the pickling room will be located. The fresh meat storage room will hold over a half a car of carcasses. A sausage room, equipped with electrically driven machinery, is located on the first floor. The slaughter cases have been so arranged to make the market more convenient.

Poultry Association Meeting Soon

The Hood River County Poultry Association has scheduled a meeting for Friday afternoon, February 25, when experts will be here for addresses on methods of poultry feeding. It is also planned to have some one here to talk to dairymen on methods of feeding their cows.

Twelfth Street Owners Complain

Business men, owning stores along Twelfth street on the Heights are complaining that the city has been dilatory in making repairs to two blocks of the thoroughfare, where the paving has worn out. The street is full of holes and is made. The property owners declare that the dust from the dried out mud is annoying.

As the property owners have already paid twice for surfacing the street, they declare further improvement should be done out of the general fund.

Peddlers Bilk Public, Is Charge

Grocers declare that peddlers who hawked oranges from a motor car here Saturday, bilked the public. It is said that the fruit sold was not of the best grade and that mixed sizes were used. The peddlers sold small-sized fruit at 25 cents per dozen in the early morning. As the day advanced the price was decreased to 14 oranges for 25 cents and 20 for 50 cents.

"We have been selling a better quality orange of the same size," says A. L. Vincent, "for the past two weeks for 20 cents per dozen."

Brook Goes to Army

Authorities, who wrote to the State Industrial Commission at Salem to advise reasons for the release of Robert Brooks, minor, committed from here for floating bad checks, state that it is announced that the boy was permitted to go free to join the army. When he came before the juvenile court last fall he was paroled on the understanding he would join the army or navy. The boy, at that time, however, left here after telling friends that he was en route to Canada. He was arrested at Seattle and returned to the Salem school from there.

Orchard Tax Refund Expected

Judge R. C. Glanville, attorney for the Brookside Orchards Co., operating tracts on the West Side, recently applied for a refund on 1919 income tax, based on loss of trees from the heavy freeze of December of that year, which will reach more than \$1,000. Subsequent to filing of the application, a ruling of the department has been received here announcing that such deductions will be permissible. No ruling, however, has been received in the specific case, the application having been forwarded to Washington.

Lantern Starts Gasoline Fire

A spectacular fire was started Monday night when a lantern on the front of a motor truck of the Oregon-Washington Truck Transportation Co. ignited gas vapor while the gasoline tank was being filled in front of the Dickson-Marsh Motor Company's garage. The interior of the gasoline tank, containing about six gallons of the highly combustible liquid caught fire. An alarm was sounded, but the flames were quickly smothered with chemicals before the fire department was able to respond.

Fire Engine Explanation Made

T. D. Waddie, secretary of the Hood River Volunteer Fire Department, has explained some criticism that has been directed at the department because a new motor-driven fire engine was not used Monday night in responding to an alarm resulting from a gasoline fire in front of the Dickson-Marsh garage. "While the truck had arrived," says Mr. Waddie, "the city had withheld acceptance until after the state fire underwriters' association had given it a formal test. This test was given Tuesday afternoon."

FISH, FURS AND FEATHERS

Deputy State Game Warden W. O. Hadley says that he has found a number of ranchers of this section carrying an erroneous interpretation of the laws governing the closed season on trout fishing. Many farmers, Mr. Hadley says, have expressed the belief that the law will permit them to catch trout over 10 inches in length. This is an error that may lead to arrest. During the closed season, from December to April, no trout may be taken. Fishermen, however, are permitted to take salmon trout or other migratory game fish over 15 inches.

It pays to advertise, declares Tel. W. Blount, assistant postmaster. Immediately following newspaper stories of a record catch of mice at the post-office, a cat appeared. It has remained ever since. Mr. Blount had already caught 23 mice, and he believes the cat will have little work. The animal, however, was fed some of the freshly killed mice.

A number of citizens have been heard to express sympathy with the postoffice force over the plague of mice and offers of cats are pouring in. The office may end with more cats than it formerly had mice.

The police received a call last week to visit the home of W. R. Greene, local Western Union manager, where a mad dog was reported. Deputy Sheriff Glenn Sloat, who responded, found a fox terrier puppy suffering from some form of poisoning. He killed the dog.

The sphenodon, a lizard-like animal, found only in New Zealand, is the only known modern representative of the great reptilian order living at the close of the carboniferous age.
