BERRY PLANTS ARE SENT TO KENNEWICK

The Kennewick, Wash., fruit district is making heavy plantings of Clark Seedling strawberries this year. W. R. Gibson & Son, local berry nurserymen, yesterday began the shipment of 600,000 plants to the neighboring Washington fruit section. All but 200,000 of the plants will be sold direct to the marketing association of Kennewick.

"We will be busy several weeks, digging, packing and forwarding our big order," says Mr. Gibson. "The Washington growers have been experimenting with a fertilizer which greatly increases the yields of Clark Seedlings. Our total order will set 48 acres of new berry fields."

Standard Oil Men Meet
