BISHOP MEADE HERE SUNDAY EVENING

Bishop Meade, of Denver, addressed a full house at Asbury church Sunday evening. He made use of the scrip ture in the second chapter of Mark's gospel which deals with new wines in old wine skins and new patches on old garments. After comparing methods of fighting in the recent war with those of the civil war, he told some startling things about modern medicine and surgery compared with the old

new methods of Christian churches. Of the 12,000,000 enlisted men, 80 per cent had no connection or interest in religion. Something is evidently wrong with the methods of the Christian churches, declared Bishop Meade. He then told of some of the constructive work done for young people in churches at the present time. Gymnasiums, rooms for social affairs, music clubs have led, not only the young people, but their parents to give their lives in Christian service, said he. 

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

Spray Controls Sawfly Logan and raspberry growers whose lants suffered injury to foliage by the raspherry sawfly should spray with arsenate of lead. The solution used by entomologists of the O. A. C. Experiment Station is 12 pounds arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water. It is applied with an angle nozzle to the ander side of the leaf. The insect ng the damage is a light green, caterpillar. It feeds on the unfor side of the leaves, causing a seri-ous ragging, in some cases the com-plete loss of the leaves.

Nursery Law Is In Effect In accordance with a law, adopted the Oregon legislature last winter effective May 25, nurserymen, ir agents or solictors must secure a from the state board of hortiture before operating in the state. he law forther requires that all nuron operating in the state furnish of \$1,000 to insure guaranties of ity of stock. The law carries a malty of \$50 fine or 30 days in jail.
