1925 FAIR DISCUSSED BY LUNCH CLUB

With Truman Butler, member of the state executive committee in charge of bringing to materialization final plans for the proposed 1925 Portland exposition, the Tuesday Lunch Club Tuesday devoted the full time of the meeting to the fair.

Mr. Butler prefaced his talk in explanation of all that has so far been undertaken by the fair committee, with an appeal for an expression of all viewpoints of the exposition. He declared that he would especially welcome any views adverse to the proposition. Except for two speakers, S. J. Moore and Rev. W. E. Boddy, all the responses were unqualifiedly in favor of the exposition.

Mr. Butler likened Oregon to a manufacturing plant, which has a certain fixed overhead expense. He stated that this overhead at the present had reached a point of crisis, and that these proposals, the fair felt that the only hope would be to increase production, in this case by increasing population.

In response to Mr. Moore, Mr. Butler stated that he had talked with Julius Meier, chairman of the fair organization, Monday, and that the latter had expressed a great optimism over the outcome of the approaching election in Portland.

Others who spoke on the matter were: C. H. Vaughan, Judge Glanville, Dr. E. D. Kanaga and Leslie Butler. The latter cited that the Northwestern Tourist Association was boosting the fair, which would, he declared, bring to the state an estimated \$50,000,000 from foreign countries, who have already signified an intention of participating.
