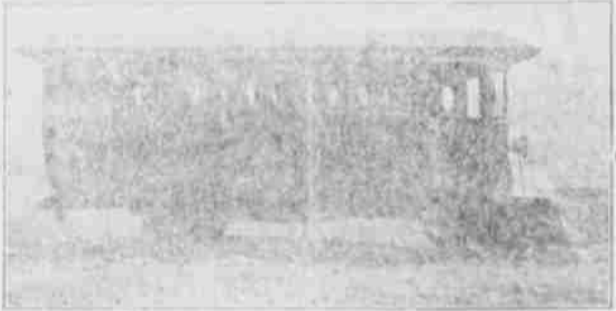

## LEGION ANTI-ALIEN LAND BILL READY

Petitions for an anti-Oriental land owning bill to be put on the ballot at the next general election will be circulated throughout the state within a few days. Capt. Wilbur announced at the state executive committee meeting of the American Legion in Portland last week that the bill is almost ready. The measure will be almost identical with the one that passed the house at the last session of the legislature, but was defeated in the senate. A few minor changes in phraseology will be made. The bill is along the lines of the California law, which has been upheld by the courts.

Capt. Wilbur said that he thought in less than two weeks petitions will be circulated in every county in the state. He says he has received a large number of letters from all sections of Oregon asking when the bill will be ready, and volunteers have offered to pass the petitions.

"This bill goes as far as we can go and covers all objectionable phases of land owning by Orientals," said Capt. Wilbur.

Attorney Wilbur, a member of the Legion's state executive committee, was appointed at the January meeting of the committee to prepare a measure for the people's vote. His work was approved at last week's session of the committee, and Legion posts throughout the state will be urged to actively support the measure. The grange also will be invited to cooperate. The United Spanish War Veterans have pledged the Legion its support of the bill.

It was decided that the 1922 state convention of the Legion will be held July 27, 28 and 29. This date was arrived at after conferring with The Dailies post.

## U. OF O. MOVIES TO BE SHOWN HERE SOON

City School Supt. Cannon has booked from the extension division of the University of Oregon the six-reel photo masterpiece, "Julius Caesar," and the three-reel film, "Merchant of Venice," for the students and people of Hood River. The films are shown March 10 and the latter March 24.

The film "Julius Caesar" portrays the life of the great Roman from 80 B. C. to 44 B. C. The famous Italian actor, Anthony Novelli, plays the role of Caesar. More than 25,000 persons appear in some of the big scenes. Unlike most historical romances, this beautiful subject is correct to the smallest detail in depicting the costumes, dress, art and military science of the times.

"The Merchant of Venice," which is based on Shakespeare's famous play, was filmed in great costume and splendor. A fleet is shown in the bay of ancient Venice. This picture takes you back to costumes, streets, boats and customs of former days and keeps you in suspense with the incidents of the unfolding drama. It is a chance to see one of the greatest plays of the world written by the greatest dramatist of all time.

These educational pictures are being sent to the schools of Oregon by the extension division of the university as part of its service in visual education.

## GIRL STUDENTS ARE UNDERWEIGHT

The following is a report of Miss Frances Elizabeth Baker, in charge of physical education in the city schools: Physical examination given to the girls of the high school and junior high school both last year and this year show the following results:

Underweight, 41 per cent, 41 per cent; defective teeth, 9 per cent, 25 per cent; enlarged thyroids, 41 per cent; defective vision, 18 per cent, 19 per cent; defective tonsils, 3 per cent, 7 per cent.

Students weighed by physical defects can not do the mental work that they would otherwise be capable of doing. For this reason the county health nurse and the girls' physical director have given the examinations, and have sent results to defective students and their parents in order that they may correct the defects.

Simple treatment at home will cure enlarged thyroids. Any physician should be able to direct you in this treatment.

No tooth will decay unless it is dirty; but when once decayed no home treatment can cure it. The sooner you go to the dentist the less pain you have to suffer, and the less money you have to part with. Bad teeth mean indigestion, lowered vitality, plague spots for contaminating sound teeth and for brooding disease germs. The individual with decayed teeth, or even with unclean teeth is open to infection of the lungs, tonsils, stomach, glands, ears, nose, and adenoid tissue. Several insurance companies give free dental treatment to policy holders; not to bestow charity, but to increase profits.

Defective vision is not due to weak eyes so much as it is due to misuse of eyes. Light for reading or close work should be neither too dim nor too bright. Light should never shine directly into the eyes but should fall over the left shoulder. If there is any question about defective vision the eyes should be tested at once. Many time minor defects can be remedied if taken in time. Correction of optical defects by glasses often gives marked relief from headache and insomnia, as well as enabling the individual to see many times things which were not within his range of vision before.

Defective tonsils, like defective teeth, are a menace to the health of the whole family. Adenoids, defective tonsils and neglected teeth are directly related to malnutrition, sickness and dullness. We can save the students from failures and from lives of inefficiency and we can save the taxpayers' money if we can teach the students hygienic habits and give them medical and dental treatment when needed.
