

OVER 76,000,000

The Census Shows That Number of People in the United States

INCREASE OF NEAR 21 PER CENT.

A Gain of 13,225,464 Human Beings in Ten Years—It Cost \$6,361,001 to Find Out the Fact.

The official announcement of the total population of the United States for 1900 is 76,296,290, of which 74,627,907 are contained in the forty-five states, representing approximately the population to be used for apportionment purposes. There is a total of 134,158 Indians not taxed. The total population in 1890, with which the aggregate population of the present census should be compared, was 63,070,766. Taking the 1890 population as a basis, there has been a gain in population of 13,225,464, during the last ten years, representing an increase of nearly 21 per cent.

There is a plan on foot among the colored people of Omaha to restore the Lincoln car, built at the opening of the civil war, to its original condition and place it in a public building, where it will be kept permanently. The Union Pacific company bought the car soon after the war and used it in the west as a pay car, it being especially desirable for this purpose, as it had within its sides, concealed by upholstery and mahogany, half-inch boiler plates. They were placed there as a protection to prevent President Lincoln from being shot while at the front, where he frequently went in his armored car.

A New York superintendent of schools says: "We have had more cases of corporal punishment to investigate this year than usual. Our boys seem more than ever given to fighting. I think it is due to the way in which most of the newspapers exploit the doings of prize fighters. Not only is a great deal of space devoted to prize fights, but the pugilists and scenes at the ringside are fully illustrated. Now, all this had a bad effect on the boys and is the cause of most of their disorderly acts."

"I came across a colored man who spoke with a German accent, the other day," said a prominent stock broker. "He was a waiter in a restaurant. His accent was so pronounced that I spoke to the proprietor about it, and found that the man was a full-blooded negro, but he had been born and reared in a small town near Reading, and had always associated with the whites, who spoke Pennsylvania Dutch."

Thirty thousand maple trees in Franklin county, N. Y., are owned by a Brooklyn millionaire. He has contracted for a big maple sugar plant, to consist of a group of buildings lighted by electricity and provided with concrete or marble floors. Three railroad lines will be laid through the woods for the purpose of gathering the sap.

During the past year 76,469 Italians emigrated to the United States, of which 53,546 were males and 22,943 females. They carried with them \$788,805. Just 1,445 Italians were refused admittance to the United States.

THE WORLD OVER

Henry Villard, the great railroad magnate, died at Dobb's Ferry, New York, on the 12th instant.

Columbus, Indiana, is declared by the late census to be the center of population of the United States.

The Paris Exposition ended on November 12th. The official statistics show that the Exposition was a gigantic success from point of attendance. More than 50,000,000 people saw the show.

Two men have been taken into custody in New York for smuggling a fortune in diamonds into this country—the famous jewels once worn by Maximilian and his Empress Carlotta, of Mexico. The jewels are worth \$76,000.

The Empress Dowager of China is dead, so the dispatches say, but the old lady continues to behead those she does not like. The latest phenomenon of the "dead" Empress is to behead a number of telegraph officials who accepted a secret message from Emperor Kwang Hsu to Count von Waldersee informing him that he (the Emperor) was being kept a prisoner and was unable to return to Peking. Bloody work for a "dead" woman.

The foreign envoys have finally agreed to a joint note, which will be pressed on China as the basis of a preliminary treaty. Among the acts which China must fulfill are: Erect a monument to Baron von Ketteler on the site where he was murdered and send an imperial prince to Germany to convey an apology; she shall inflict the death penalty upon eleven princes and officials already named and suspend provincial examinations for five years where the outrages occurred; in future all officials failing to prevent anti-foreign outrages within their jurisdiction are to be dismissed and punished; indemnity shall be paid to the states, corporations and individuals; the Tsung-li Yamen shall be abolished and its functions vested in a foreign minister; rational intercourse shall be permitted with the Emperor as in civilized countries; imperial proclamations shall be posted for two years throughout the empire suppressing the Boxers. There other conditions, but the ones mentioned are the most important.

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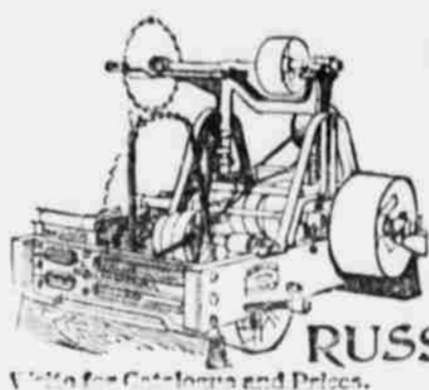
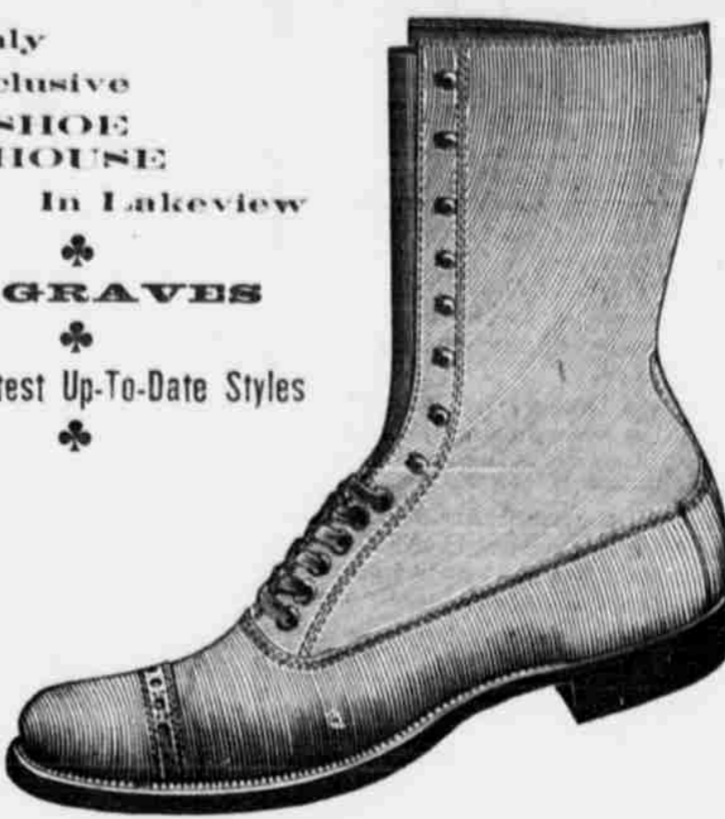
