CENTRAL OREGON HAS MUCH TIMBER

In the January Timberman an estimate is made of the pine timber that is opened by the Central Oregon railroad work that is now in progress. On the reserves and private holdings, it is stated that Klamath County alone has 40,000,000,000 feet of timber much more than has been credited to the Klamath district. The pine belt is given a length of 200 miles, with average width of 50 miles along the eastern slope of the Cascades. Taking the timber that is in Lake and Crook counties, and that portion of the Blue and Strawberry Mountain ranges that will be marked as Central Oregon, the total is believed to easily reach 100,000,000,000 feet, board measure, of splendid wood.
