PLAYS AND PLAYERS.

Maxine Elliott has scored nicely in her latest play, "Under the Greenwood Tree."

William Morgan, who has been with the Rogers brothers in several of their former plays, will appear with them again in "The Rogers Brothers in Panama."

Miss Mary Ryan will play one more season with "Brewster's Millions," then, if the proper vehicle can be found, she will be a star in the season of 1908-9.

Richard Carle's latest production, "Mary's Lamb," has been withdrawn from the stage and permanently shelved. This is the musical play in which Harry Conner has been starring.

Mrs. Rida Johnson Young is at work on a comedy, "Sweet Sixteen," for Margaret Clark, which is to be produced in February, and will write a rural play on "Life on the Eastern Shore."

Franz Lehár, the composer of "The Merry Widow," is to have a new comic opera produced in Vienna called "The Man With Three Wives." The American rights have already been secured, but by whom it is not stated.

CHURCH WORK.

The bishop of London, who made such a notable visit to this country last September, is now planning to tour Russia.

It is now just twenty-five years since Bishop Malmlieu formed the Boston district of the Swedish Methodist church, the first church of the Swedish Methodists having been organized just two years previous to that time.

The Holiness church, whose members are mainly in Texas, Arkansas, Tennessee and Missouri, has joined with the Association of Pentecostal Churches of New England, bringing under one head about 12,000 communicants.

Eight churches in one of the suburbs of Baltimore secured trained men to take a church census of that section, and a card index has now been arranged that tells the ministers all about the religious affiliations of every family of that locality.

NEW YORK CITY.

New York city's law department will cost the taxpayers \$2,149 a day during 1908.

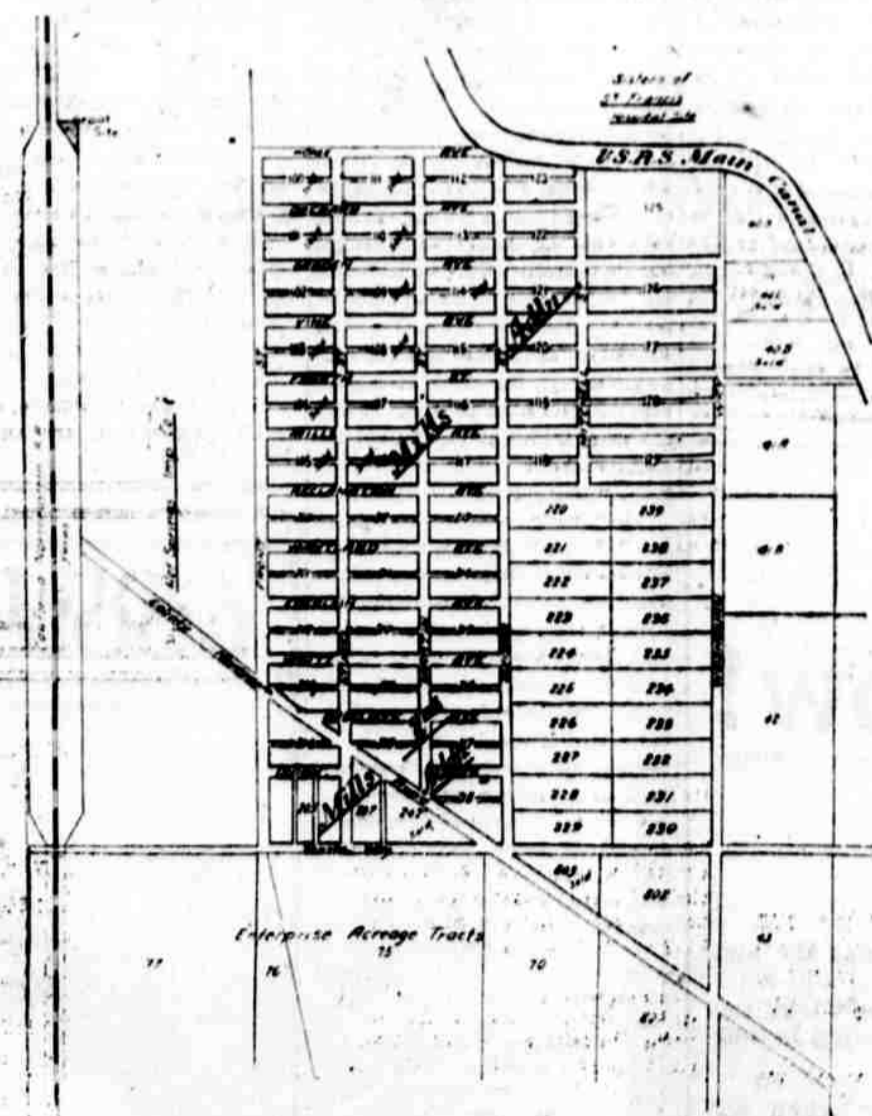
