Judge George E. Gray of Dover Delaware, is the latest entry in the Democratic race for the presidential nomination. Gray's supporters believe he will become a factor to reckon with in the Denver convention.

E. H. Harriman is sure of at least one job for another year. He was on Tuesday re-elected director of the Oregon & California Railroad Company, without a dissenting vote. General satisfaction with the way he had been running the road and keeping Uncle Sam from taking 3,250,000 acres of land grant away from him, it is understood, was expressed by each of the voting stock holders present.

The primary campaign which ends to day has been one of the clearest political contests in the history of the county, and from present indications it looks as if by to-morrow, there would be no hard feelings on the part of any of the defeated aspirants. This is as it should be and this policy should be followed in the campaign for the June election. Keep personal matters out of the campaign and let each candidate make his fight on his own qualifications, rather than on the unfitness of the other fellow.

The Civic Federation has seen fit to nominate a ticket for the city election, before the legal time set for that purpose. We cannot see any strong objection to this if they so desire. Neither can we see any good to be accomplished. In a city of this size a man is elected to office, not on any promises or any platform he may adopt, but on account of the confidence which the voters have in his intelligence and ability to meet the many important questions which will arise during his administration. There is no place where the people rule more completely than in a municipal election, and we have confidence in the citizenship of Klamath Falls to feel sure that they are capable of selecting their own officers without dictation. It would be presumptuous for a few people to declare that certain men were the only men in the city capable or fit to fill certain offices but it might not be amiss for them to suggest candidates which they might feel were capable. Without knowledge to the contrary we take it for granted that this is their only intention. This, then, leaves us where we started. The people will select their own officers according to the provisions of the law, and will not necessarily be controlled by the machinations of any organization. There will be no ticket to be put through, but each individual voter should vote for the man whom he sincerely believes is the most capable and active man for each separate office. If all the citizens will turn out at the election, there need be no fear that we will not get a good set of officials.
