**TWO BIDS RECEIVED**  
Clear Lake Dam May Be Built  
**SECRETARY TO SAY**  
Same Contractors Who Bid On South Branch Place Bids on New Dam

The local Reclamation office has been advised that two bids were received for the Clear Lake Dam. The work is divided into two schedules, the first being the dam proper and the second the sluiceway at the lower end of the lake. The bids received were as follows:

Maloney Bros., of San Francisco, schedule 1, \$94,950; schedule 2, \$30,820; total, \$125,770.

Maney Bros., of Winnemucca, Nev., schedule 1, \$157,045; schedule 2, \$31,000; total, \$188,045.

The contractors bidding on this work are the same that bid on the South Branch canal. Maney Bros. were the lowest bidder on that contract, while the other contractors are the lowest bidder in this case. The bids on the South Branch are still in the hands of the secretary of the Interior awaiting action. The bids on the Clear Lake dam will also be submitted to the secretary for final action.

The people of the Upper Project are signing up their lands, and it is very probable that if the bids, or either of them, should be satisfactory that some construction work may be begun on the Clear Lake Dam this year. A special effort is being made to get all owners to sign up at once so that no delay will not be the fault of the people, if any delay should follow. Several parties have recently visited the dam who have not signed their lands for government irrigation and chances are that the required percentage will be secured within a few weeks.

**TEACHERS ARE CHOSEN**

**A Strong Corps For Ensuing Year**  
**DUNBAR RE-ELECTED**

**Every Assurance That The High Standard Of School Will Be Maintained**

Klamath Falls Public Schools will have an exceptionally strong teaching corps next year. The school board for this district in the selection of instructors put special stress upon the qualifications of the applicants. This same course has been followed out for several years and as a result the public schools of this city rank foremost among those of the state. The directors of this district believe in securing good teachers, and not another town in the state of Oregon pays better salaries for instructors that are paid in this city. The principal receives \$133.33 per month, and the lowest paid any teacher is \$65 per month. Under the able supervision of Principal Dunbar the schools of Klamath Falls have come to the front in a manner that is attracting attention and Prof. Dunbar has gained recognition as one of the best public school instructors in the state. He has been offered numerous positions in other public schools and principalships of high schools, but the school board of this district has refused to let him go, and next year the schools will again be in his charge.

The directors have selected the following teachers for the ensuing year: Principal, R. H. Dunbar, and the Misses Stella Campbell, Alice M. Pool, Mabel Campbell, Nettie Drew, Anna Benson, Edna Jensen, Carrie Ridings, Carlotta Gast and Mary Davison.  
With the exception of the Misses Drew and Gast the teachers are the same who were engaged last year and this gives assurance that Principal Dunbar will be ably assisted in keeping the schools up to the high standard.

**Local Option Meeting**

There will be a local option meeting tonight at the Methodist church. J. K. Howard will address the meeting and report his impressions of how the vote will go in the various precincts of the county where he has spoken during the past ten days. A meeting for men only will be held at the opera house at 3 p. m. Sunday. Boys over 15 years may come. At 8 p. m. will be a mass meeting for all at the opera house. All are invited to attend these meetings.

**CAKE DEFEATS SENATOR FULTON**

The returns so far as can be received show that H. M. Cake will carry the state by about 5000 over Senator Fulton, and in the First District Ellis gets the nomination for congressman defeating Geer and Shepard.

**MERRYMAN AND KUYKENDALL WIN**

The latest report from Lake County gives the following vote; For State Senator: Holgate, 87; Merryman, 109; Willits, 82. Prosecuting Attorney, Kuykendall, 108 and Mills 163. There are yet five small precincts to hear from in Lake County with a possible republican vote of 70. This will increase Mills vote but not enough to overcome the lead of Kuykendall in this county of 118. No figures are obtainable from Crook County but a wire was received that Dr. Merryman would carry the county. This will give him a good plurality in every county in the district.

The performance of "Oliver Twist" last night by the Mong company was largely attended and the actors again distinguished themselves in their various parts. Mrs. Harvey and Mr. Grandin were exceptionally good in their parts as Belle Sykes and the Artful Dodger.
