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Newspaper LAW OF OREGON.—Section 2002 of the laws of Oregon provides that whenever any person circulating a newspaper shall mail such newspaper to any person in this State without first receiving an order therefor, such newspaper shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person, whether said newspaper is received by the person to whom it is sent or not.

MR. HARRY CADEN

There is one young man in this city who is liable to go into an early decline on account of the immense burden of responsibility he seems to think has devolved upon his shoulders, in the management of the city's affairs. It is true that the people have not encouraged this young man to assume any of the responsibilities of the city business, but he is a very conscientious young man and in as-much as the land-owners are paying him a salary to act in a clerical capacity in the government service for a period of eight hours a day, he feels in duty bound to use a large portion of that time in stirring up trouble for men whose hours of business are too long each day to allow them any leisure time to hunt for trouble.

Now, we would like to know who is responsible for the actions of the Civic Federation? Is it the President or the Secretary? Hundreds of letters have been sent out, signed by Harry Caden, Secretary, which we believe have been entirely without the knowledge or sanction of the other officers or members of the Federation. Any adverse criticism these letters may create, naturally reacts against that body. Now it is just such men as these who are doing our city an inestimable amount of harm. Men who are content to spend their life working for a small monthly salary and whose only ambition seems to be to hear themselves talk and see their name in print. The sooner the Federation rids itself of such men the sooner it will secure the support of reliable business men and property owners.

Congressman Nicholas Longworth, the president's son-in-law, hinted in an interview on politics that there is a strong likelihood of the Chicago convention stampeding in favor of President Roosevelt and in that event—well he wouldn't venture to say what might happen. Longworth had been asked if there was the remotest sort of a probability that Roosevelt would accept the nomination. "I am sure of one thing," answered the Ohio legislator, that the president is sincere when he says he doesn't want another term, but if the convention should stampede to him I positively cannot say what his attitude would be. If he has his own way about it, however, the nomination will not be forced upon him."

Judge Burnett has sustained the demurrer to the \$5000 damage suit brought against Senator Fulton by J. S. Smith in the circuit court of Marion county. The decision will in all probability dismiss the suit entirely. Smith had charged that Fulton accused him of perjury and wanted damages for defamation of character on that ground.

A. C. Trica, founder of a school for aeronautics, declares that wonderful progress is being made in aerial navigation and that within three years time one may be able to board an airship in New York and cross the continent with considerable speed, and with as little danger as if one were in a palace car. Airships will solve the problem, he says, and not dirigible balloons.
