**FOUND SKELETON**

**WEED, July 29.**—A complete human skeleton was found yesterday in the woods two miles east of this place. There was no flesh on the bones. The skull was fifty feet from the main part of the skeleton. A complete outfit of clothing was near the skeleton. The character of the raiment indicated that the man was well dressed. Nothing was found in the pockets by which the dead could be identified. Wads of green paper were found in one of the vest pockets. Dr. Legge, who made the examination, thinks these wads were rolls of greenbacks. He was afraid to try to unroll them lest he destroy the valuable paper. They will be sent to the subtreasurer in San Francisco, where it is expected some expert will be able to unroll the green rolls and determine the value of the greenbacks, if such the paper proves to be.

**COUNTY NEWS**

**(Merrill Record.)**  
 Dr. Alex. Patterson arrived home from San Francisco last Friday night, having left his wife and children at the home of Mrs. Patterson's mother in that city. Mrs. Patterson will remain with her mother for some time longer before returning home, as the latter lady is quite seriously ill and requires the loving care and attention of her daughter. As the stage from Klamath Falls to Merrill was nearing Whitelake postoffice to-day the doubletree broke, causing the team to run away. The tongue fell from the neckyoke and the driver, holding on to the lines, was pulled from the vehicle and along the ground into the sage brush, receiving severe cuts before he was forced to let go. The horses then ran through a barb-wire fence, one of

them being badly injured. The two passengers on the stage were not hurt. After catching the horses the driver finished his trip to this city with them, but the one cut with the wire, it is thought, will die. George Wilson received his alfalfa meal machinery the first of the week and he ground out the first lot of alfalfa in the valley on Monday afternoon. The machine has a ten horsepower engine with an upright boiler and the total weight of the paraphernalia is a little less than three tons, yet the little giant has the capacity of turning five tons of alfalfa per day into a meal that is said to be much more economical in feeding than the hay, the loss being only 1 per cent to 10 per cent for the unground hay. The meal only occupies a very small space, it being possible to put 100 pounds into an ordinary grain sack under pressure. The business of making this meal has grown to great proportions in some parts of the coast, and it is now being shipped to all parts of the country. People living in towns, especially, buy it more readily than they do baled hay on account of the much less space it occupies and the greater saving in feeding it. It is a safe prediction that Mr. Wilson's venture will prove a success, and that this is but the first of many such machines that will be installed in the alfalfa belt.

Last year \$56,000,000 was spent by the railroads of the United States for crossties. The average price of the ties was 50 cents each. Only six per cent of the ties were used by electric railroads. Forty-three per cent of the ties were of oak and nineteen per cent of yellow pine. Owing to the growing scarcity of suitable timber, other woods are being used after treatment with various preservatives, and it has been found that these treated woods outlast the more expensive untreated oak ties.

**THE WAY THEY DO IT AT GRANTS PASS**

The tale of the man with the "salted" mine is as old as the discovery of gold, but it took a Grants Pass man to dope out the real way of "salting" a vineyard so as to make it sell readily to the Eastern men who are flocking into Oregon in search of investments. His plan is said to have worked splendidly until one of the investors investigated. The real estate man "salted" his vineyard by visiting his neighbor's patch and picking therefrom a large number of grape clusters. These he attached to the grape vines by means of fine wire. Then, for the customer who was driven past the land, but always at such a time as it was necessary to return to town in a hurry. Everything worked all right until one of the men investigated. Then the "salter" was forced to ring off.
