The bill of the Klamath Chronicle, amounting to \$293.05, was referred to the finance committee.

Councilman Stone asked for a leave of absence for thirty days, which was granted.

Ordinance

An ordinance specifying what shall constitute a bitulithic pavement was introduced, and the motion to pass it to its second reading was lost by the following vote:

Yes—Castel, Hanks and Summers.

No—Wilkins, Stone, Faught and Obenchain.

The ordinance granting to the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company a franchise to conduct its business in this city for a period of twenty-five years, was lost by the following vote:

Yes—Wilkins, Castel, Stone and Obenchain.

No—Summers and Faught.

Hanks did not vote.

An amended ordinance specifying that bitulithic paving be laid on Main street from the bridge to Eleventh and on Sixth street from Main to Kinloch avenue was introduced and passed to its second reading by the following vote:

Yes—Castel, Hanks, Summers and Faught.

No—Stone and Obenchain.

Wilkins not voting.

Council instructed the police judge to advertise for contracts to fill the streets on which contracts had not been accepted.

On motion of Castel the city recorder was authorized to purchase four police clubs for the use of the police.

Council adjourned until tonight.
