FIFTEEN ELK IN CRATER RESERVE

GOVERNOR WEST IS RECEIVING REPORTS ON THE VARIOUS KINDS OF GAME IN OREGON NATIONAL FORESTS.

SALEM, May 15.—Governor West has received a complete report from the United States forestry service in which an estimate of the conditions of game in the various national forests in Oregon is made, and which the governor will refer to the state fish and game commission. The estimate is based upon investigations of supervisors of the several forests concerned. The report estimates elk as follows: Cascade forest, 30; Malheur forest, 20, with hunters killing an average of five a year; Oregon national forest, 75; Siskiyou forest, 50; Kula forest, 200; Umatilla forest, 12; Whitman forest, 125, with hunters killing an average of 225 annually; Crater national forest, 15, with wolves destroying nearly all the young, while the winters pull down the weak ones. In all, the estimate limits the number of elk in the national forests in Oregon to 528. It is estimated that 100,000 of various species of deer are found within the boundaries of Oregon forests, and about 14,000 of these are killed annually by hunters, while 20,000 are the prey of predatory animals. The report estimates that the forests contain about 40 per cent of their productive capacity of field birds, while ducks appear to be decreasing about 2 per cent annually in the reserves, especially in the region of Crater Lake forest on account of the fact that 5,000 persons spend from one to six weeks each season there hunting and fishing.

"AMERICA FIRST" MOVE IS TO BE STARTED SOON

PORTLAND, May 15.—Tom Richardson has returned from Baltimore, where he carried on a short publicity campaign and organized the commercial interest so they will boost their city. Mr. Richardson reports a great movement has been started there to induce Americans to see their own country before going to Europe. A big convention will be held there January 22-27, next to further this idea. "Oregon should be deeply interested in this convention," said Mr. Richardson. "If Oregon could secure one per cent of the people of the congested cities of the East who should move, it would more than double the population of the state. The old East has no patriotism. The people talk about travel in and know only Europe and other far countries, and European travel drains this country of \$400,000,000 every year. Every community in the West should strive to make this convention one of the greatest ever held. We must arrest foreign sentiment, and at least make our national capital an American city."

Justice Wright sentenced Gompers to one year in prison, Mitchell to nine months and Morrison to six months. The labor leaders disclaimed any intention of deliberately violating the court's order, and injected the issue of free speech and free press. On an appeal, the decision of the lower court sentencing the men to jail was affirmed by the District of Columbia court of appeals. The case was then appealed to the supreme court of the United States.

tional boycott had been in progress for several months, the stove company sued the officers of the federation to enjoin further boycott. On December 18, 1907, Justice Gould of the supreme court of the District of Columbia, granted a temporary injunction to restrain publication of the name of the Buck's company in the unfair list and to stop the boycott.

Almost immediately after this decision the American Federationist appeared with the name of the Buck's company still prominently displayed in the "we don't patronize" list. About the same time the convention of the United Mine Workers, president
