GIRL TEACHERS GET LAND WHILE GUIDING CHILDREN
Three of Them in Christmas Lake Valley Acquiring Homesteads While They Are Performing Their Regular School Duties

LAKEVIEW, Nov. 1.—J. Q. Willett, the new county school superintendent, has returned after a trip through the Warner country. The schools of the county are in a prosperous condition, and the personnel of the teaching force of the county is far above the average for rural districts.
The percentage of the first and second grade certificates is so large that it is the exception instead of the rule to find a "third grader" in any of the schools. The teachers in the newly settled valleys are probably on an equal footing with the members of the higher grade schools in the cities, for many of them, both men and women have had experience throughout the United States.
In the Fort Rock section of Pleasant Valley, or the Christmas Lake Valley, as it is generally known, there were three teachers of the gentler sex that were holding down claims, and they supported themselves and improved their claims while teaching school.
