**BIG SHEEP DRIVE OVER AT LAST**

**EIGHT THOUSAND LAMBS DELIVERED TO MCKENDREE AND ARTHUR BY DAVE EDLER OF THE LAKEVIEW COUNTRY**

This evening Dave Edler will turn over to McKendree and Arthur the last bunch of 8,000 lambs, which the latter purchased of him at his Lake county ranch several weeks ago. The lambs were bought delivered at Klamath Falls, at \$2.25, and this evening the last of the delivery will be made.

The lambs were driven from Lake county in four bunches, of 2,000 in a drove, and have been arriving since the early part of last week. In the meantime Shone and Charlie have been busy buying up all the available stubble in this vicinity on which to feed the animals until they are put into winter quarters.

A shipment of about 2,000 of the top lambs will be made this fall, in all probability, while the balance will be kept this winter on Fred McKendree's place, near Merrill, where extensive preparations have been made to feed them. One item of their feed was the purchase at one time of 125,000 pounds of ground feed from the Martin Bros. mill at Merrill.

Besides this big bunch McKendree and Arthur have purchased several other smaller bunches of lambs and quite a bunch of wethers, so that they will probably have their hands full with their care and maintenance when the country is covered with the beautiful snow.

**NEWELL MAY NOT VISIT KLAMATH**

E. G. Hopson of Portland, supervising engineer, Pacific district, United States reclamation service, who oversees the work done on the Orland, Truckee-Carson, Umatilla and Klamath projects, was recently at the Truckee-Carson project with F. H. Newell, director of the reclamation service, and the two officials were expected to come to this city and look over what is being done on the local project, but as Mr. Hopson has returned to Portland without any definite word as to coming here, it is believed possible that the head of the service, Mr. Newell, will return to Washington without making a visit to the Klamath project. Mr. Hopson was in the city about a month ago in relation to the problem of turning over to the city the Ankeny canal.

It is predicted that the election will pick Newton Baker, the mayor of Cleveland, and return Mayor Brand Whitlock of Toledo.

**MANCHUS SLAY GENERAL, ALLEGING HIM DISLOYAL**

**Provincial Governor Is Assured When Bloodthirsty Thirsty Rush by the Guard and Hack His Body to Bits in Murderous Frenzy**

SHANGHAI, Nov. 7.—Manchu soldiers assassinated General Wu Lu Chen, the new governor of the province, accusing him of treason to the throne.

He was a progressive, but was opposed to the emperor's deposition from his royal seat.

General Wu was asleep in his tent when killed.

Thirty Manchus rushed past the guards, entered and cut Wu to pieces. Wu's troops caught the assassins. They asserted that Wu's alleged loyalty to the throne was false, and declared he was secretly urging the massacre of Manchus.

The assassins will be beheaded.
