

FISHER CARRIES OUT PROMISE TO WILL STEEL

Recommends Appropriation for Crater Lake Park Roads, But Leaves Matter Open so Mr. Steel Can Appear Before the Committee

MEDFORD, Nov. 24.—Carrying out his promise made a few weeks ago to Will G. Steel, Secretary Fisher of the department of the interior has placed in his annual report a recommendation for an expenditure of \$153,000 for roads in the Crater Lake National Park. However, Mr. Fisher added to this recommendation the statement that "the department reserves the right to submit the original estimate, or an amended one, at the hearing before the committee."

This insertion gives Mr. Steel an excellent opportunity to present any considerations which he may think important before the appropriations committee when they take up the matter.

Mr. Steel left Tuesday evening for Washington to begin his work of securing an appropriation of \$500,000 for the Crater National Park. He has several large interests behind him and has many friends among the officials, so that his success seems certain.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Editor Herald—I have for some time been a silent reader of the city papers so far as a matter of a suitable water supply for the city is concerned, but have in common with hundreds of other citizens all along realized that no municipality can prosper without clean water more than it can without clean streets, clean residences and clean government. And in common with many other humble inhabitants of our city, I have been disposed to trust to the wisdom of the powers that be to give the needed relief from the present unfortunate conditions as soon as practicable, and to take steps to provide a supply of water for the most promising municipalities in all the West. Surely the limpid streams that

pour down from the volcanic walls of the Cascades are not excellent for purity in the world, nor is there any reason to believe that the crystal waters that rise in the gorge through which the river descends from the Upper Lake to Lake Ewauna are less pure than those which pour down from the mountains, or that may possibly lie below the wash deposit of diatomaceous earth which underlies so much of the Klamath Basin. This chalk or diatomaceous earth is impervious to water, and no water can escape through it unless seams or fractures occur in it, and it is altogether probable that most reservoirs lie beneath this deposit, under tremendous pressure, which will rise to and above the surface whenever drills actually pass through to the unfailing supply which nature holds in reserve for the needs of a developing country.

Two years ago the writer had in mind a plan which contemplated drilling a well for artesian water in the court house yard at the expense of the county, so that this question as to the feasibility of tapping a never failing supply beneath the diatomaceous floor might be fully tested, at the expense of all the property holders of the county, including, of course, many wealthy timber men and other capitalists, who would have had to bear no inconsiderable part of the expense. However, that modest suggestion, which might, if carried out, have not only settled a question of incalculable value to the county generally, but might have produced in a rational and inexpensive way, a never failing supply of pure water for a great city while it met with no open opposition, created no interest, and so perished undeveloped.

Now this matter can still be decided and on the same lines if the county authorities, who are already on the ground at the poor farm with a drilling outfit, and actually drilling down through the diatomaceous floor, will keep the process going until they actually reach the bottom of the great lake which once occupied this region, and perhaps tap imprisoned water

which may rise even above the Summers butte.

Now let us encourage these men. Hold up their hands. Say "dig, dig," and let them feel that they have the almost undivided, or entirely undivided support of the citizenship of the county.

Now the writer does not condemn as unwise the proposition of the municipal authorities taking such steps as may be legally necessary to select and tie up for possible use some splendid streams of pure water which now rushes down the walls of the Cascades or bubbles in great springs from the base of the mountains, for that would surely be wise, but it will take much time and much money to develop a system such an undertaking would require. In the meantime, at all times, everyday, we must have water, and in a country where nature has made such lavish provision, we ought not to be long without the indispensable element in its purity.

It is evident that we must look near home for our immediate supply of pure water, and shall hope to see the water company lose no time unnecessarily in providing what we must surely have. If, as has been stated, the water from which the city supply comes was contaminated from reason of the decay of a wooden sewer on Conger avenue, what is to prevent the acquisition of other springs if necessary along the river, and of excavating to bedrock, and so concretizing the flow that there could be no possible chance for contamination until the water enters the circulation system of the city?
