NAUSEATING SENTIMENT

JUST as soon as the McNamaras pled guilty in Judge Bordwell's court in Los Angeles, a magazine writer named Lincoln Steffens opened up with a number of articles in which he claimed credit for the conclusion of the case. He also sent a telegram to a Chicago paper, saying that the people were not satisfied, but wanted more victims—"more blood."

As a rule, Steffens is a pretty reliable man. He is a clever writer and a keen investigator, but it is apparent in this case that the man has gone soft.

Nobody is going to worry about giving credit to Steffens for anything in the matter. The circumstances of the case do not reflect any credit on him, whether any is due or not.

While it is very doubtful whether he is entitled to anything more than the checks which will pay for his articles, let it be supposed that he was the mediator, and grant, for the purpose of illustration, that he was the agency which caused the windup of the case in the form which has made the world express its astonishment.

For him to follow this up and claim that the people of Los Angeles are blood-thirsty, and clamoring for victims, is the rankest kind of rant.

Regardless of whether men are unionists or free workers, whether they are church members or heretics white or black, it is to be said that any man who uses dynamite in the destruction of property, should not be the object of prosecution?

Leaving entirely out of the case the matter of the struggle between labor and capital, which is possibly hotter in Los Angeles, in some respects, than any where else, the dynamiting of property should be severely censured, and those who follow that line of endeavor, whether it be one time or many, should be summarily dealt with.

But Steffens, because the prosecution of the McNamaras was pushed until they found the net drawing about them closer, until they thought they might as well give up and admit their guilt, makes the public charge that the people are after blood.

Does it sound good? Hardly. How about the twenty persons whose lives were snuffed out by one of the most dastardly acts in the history of this country?

Was anyone after blood when they were sacrificed to the altar of anarchy, which Clarence Darrow, who knowingly defended the McNamaras, tries to disguise under the soft term of fanaticism?

There are a great many people not directly interested in the Los Angeles cases who do not believe with Harrison Gray Otis in his attitude toward unions, and who will say his methods of fighting them are unfair and plainly overworked, as evidenced by the copies of his newspaper, the Los Angeles Times.

But if a man conducts a newspaper whose utterances are unfair, or even absolutely untrue, is that any reason why his servants, men who are compelled to work somewhere for a living, may be blown up by the wholesale?

Is it any reason why those who are guilty of using an explosive to cripple a newspaper should not have all the punishment meted out to them that they deserve?

Isn't the excuse offered by one of the McNamaras that he wished only to injure the building, and not harm human beings, about the worst you ever heard of?

What man would expect to blow up a building without harming the occupants, or without knowing that life and limb were almost inevitably to be destroyed thereby?

The endeavors at palliation made by Steffens, Darrow and the McNamaras are nauseating, to say the least, and will cause a revulsion of feeling toward those persons among those who have tried to keep their minds open in the matter.

IMPEACH MR. LITTLETON A MEMBER OF CONGRESS

This Is Aim of Demand Presented to Speaker Champ Clark, Which Appears to Be on Basis That Member Is Alleged Trust Ally

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—Demand for impeachment of Congressman Littleton of New York has been presented to Speaker Champ Clark to be filed in the house, by Henry B. Marilla of the anti-trust league.

The demand also includes a request for Congressman Littleton's expulsion from congress. The demand is framed as a memorial accompanying the resolutions adopted by the league, which characterizes Littleton as a trust ally.
