FRANCE'S AVIATION HOPES WOULD MAKE HER SUPREME

In That Field of Advancement—She Fears That Teutons May Forge Ahead in Matters of Aircraft, and Put Her in the "Also Ran" Class

PARIS, Feb. 2.—It is probable that each of the eighty-seven departments in the French republic will donate an airplane to the army, the machines to bear the names of the departments presenting them. The scheme is the outcome of a too small appropriation for the air division made by the chamber of deputies. There is a growing feeling here that France's destiny will be fought out in the clouds.

Fear that Germany, "the enemy," might forge ahead in the matter of aircraft is general. The man in the street says England has the most powerful water force, Germany the biggest standing army, so France ought to keep her lead as mistress of the air.

"QUEER" SHOVER'S PENALTY SHORTEST OF ITS KIND

Man Convicted of Counterfeiting 85 Gold Pieces Gets One Day in Jail, Briefest Sentence on Record for Such Offense

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—Geo. Wilson, convicted of counterfeiting 85 gold pieces, has just been released from the Alameda county jail after serving the shortest sentence ever meted out to a prisoner for such an offense. He was given a one day sentence and a fine of \$250.

Wilson was given the minimum sentence because of testimony showing his good character in the past. He was convicted Saturday and sentenced and sent to jail Monday.
