**MAYOR'S SALARY \$6000  
IS COMMITTEES PLAN**

The Charter Body Also Favors Extending the Civil Service to Include the Office of Chief of the Police Department

PORTLAND, March 22.—That the mayor shall receive \$6,000 and each of the four commissioners \$5,000 a year under the proposed commission form of government was the decision of the charter committee at a meeting held Monday. Each of the commissioners will be at the head of some department of the city, the assignments being made by the commissioners after they are elected.

There were many matters of importance discussed by the committee, the most important of which was the election of the city auditor, city treasurer, city attorney and municipal judge, but no decision was reached. It was proposed that the civil service provisions of the present charter be extended so as to include the chief of police, deputies in the office of city attorney, and others not now employed under civil service, but the members were not prepared to take a final vote on this question, and it was held in abeyance until the next meeting.
