Bridegroom Is Very Young, and His Father Is Owner of Over One Million Acres of British Soil, Which Is Going Some

LONDON, April 12.—The biggest society of the year took place yesterday at St. Peter's church, Eaton Square, when the Marquis of Stafford and heir of the Duke of Sutherland, Britain's greatest landowner, was married to Lady Eileen Butler, daughter of the Earl and Countess of Lanesborough.

The bridegroom is 23 years of age, and his father owns about 1,358,000 acres, or more than one-sixteenth of the entire United Kingdom. From these estates alone he draws a yearly income of over a million dollars, and he also owns huge tracts of land in Canada.

The bride, who is two years younger, is one of the most beautiful and popular girls in society, and has many friends in America and Canada. Her father was military secretary to Earl Gray at Ottawa, and served with distinction in the South African war.

The wedding presents are magnificent, and include gifts from King George, Queen Mary and other members of the royal family.

The Duke of Sutherland owns so much of Scotland that the late Shah of Persia, when in England some fifteen years ago, seriously advised King Edward to have him strangled, as being too powerful a subject.

OPINIONS ON ILLINOIS FIGHT BY POLITICIANS

Here Are Judgments on Results of Roosevelt's Victory Patterned to Suit Almost All Tastes, Whether Taft, Roosevelt or La Follette

CHICAGO, April 12.—Thomas McCusker, campaign manager for La Follette in Oregon: "Roosevelt's victory in Illinois will have no effect on the Oregon voters. They realize La Follette made no fight in Illinois. La Follette will have the balance of power. The republican national convention will nominate La Follette or a man that suits his supporters."

W. B. Ayer, chairman Taft campaign committee in Oregon: "While disappointed over President Taft's defeat, I know the only effect it will have on the Oregon electorate will be to cause it harder to battle for the President. I am confident Taft will carry Oregon at the primaries April 19th."

Daniel Kellaher, Oregon state senator: "It is no surprise to me. From now on it will be a succession of victories for Roosevelt. He will carry Oregon at the primaries by a substantial plurality."

Meyer Lissner, Los Angeles: "The Illinois primaries provided the first real test of public sentiment recorded. We have had an opportunity to see how white people feel. I venture to predict that California will give Roosevelt as large a majority as did Illinois."
