MOOSERS CLAIM TO HAVE CHANGE

State returns, A. W. Lafferty has been re-elected to congress. Ben Olcott was an easy winner for secretary of state.
 John D. Mickle was elected state dairy and food inspector, Clyde Atchinson was re-elected railroad commissioner, Robert Aekin was re-elected supreme court justice. N. J. Sinsott was elected to congress from the Second district; W. C. Hawley from the First district. Lane (democrat) and Selling (republican) are fighting it out between them. Bourne is hopelessly out of the running.
 The presidential result is still in doubt, with indications that Wilson will have a slight lead over Roosevelt. The Colonel is running strong in many districts, however, and the progressives are hopeful. They are encouraged by later returns, and the progressive leaders are now claiming Oregon.
 "We are not willing to concede Oregon to Wilson," declared L. M. Lepper, secretary of the Roosevelt progressive state central committee. "We believe this state will be found in the bull moose party column."
 Returns are still lagging on account of the cumbersome ballot, but with state wide indications that woman suffrage has carried and the capital punishment proposition overwhelmingly beaten.
 Single tax for Multnomah county is already doomed.

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—Incomplete returns from counties in Oregon up to an early hour this morning give Taft 2,721, Wilson 2,222, Roosevelt 2,055. Returns from the same counties give the following vote for United States senator: Selling 2,440, Bourne 2,422, Lane 2,220, Clark 916.
 In these tabulations Selling's up-state vote overcomes Bourne's lead over him in Multnomah county. It is indicated from meagre figures that suffrage has carried by about 2,000 in the state.
 Roosevelt's lead over Taft in Multnomah county indicates that the Colonel will gain second place in the complete count, although Taft is a strong runner-up for this dubious honor.
 Single tax in Multnomah county has been snuffed under, indications are that the same fate overtook the state graduated tax proposition and an elaboration of the single tax idea. Figures on other measures will not be available until late today.
 Many of the personal fights will be undecided for several hours.
 Scattering returns throughout Marion county indicate that Roosevelt is a winner there by a big margin.
 Selling and suffrage are also strong in Marion county.
 Clackamas county appears to favor Wilson and Lane, and will give suffrage a good majority.
 Taft and Selling carry Umatilla county. Wilson and Selling are very strong in Benton, while Roosevelt leads in Union. Wilson up to the present beats Taft and Roosevelt in Grant county. Lane leads for senator in Grant.
 Taft and Selling lead in Washington county, while Roosevelt will capture Hood River county.
 In Baker county Roosevelt and Wilson are running neck and neck, while Lane and Clark lead for senator.
 Wilson and suffrage will carry in Jackson county by an overwhelming majority, while the president elect may claim a handsome majority in Lane county. Roosevelt and Bourne will run third in Clatsop county, a Roosevelt stronghold. Wilson leads sparsely and Selling appears to be the senatorial favorite.
 Taft will carry Gilliam county, with Selling leading for senator.
 Suffrage was struck a heavy blow in Wallawa county county, according to the latest returns, while Wilson and Selling lead there.
 In the remainder of the state Selling appears to lead, while Wilson leads in the presidential returns, with Roosevelt and Taft both running strong.
 With the exception of Wallawa county, suffrage appears to have a slight lead generally, with the final result clouded in doubt.
