revenue to be raised by levy of the annual tax for park purposes, the same as was levied last year. The park board also levied the tax for park purposes at the Tuesday meeting, being one-half mill on the assessed valuation of the taxable property within the city limits.

Those present at the meeting were Mayor T. F. Nicholas, ex-officio chairman of the board; George T. Baldwin, Frank Ira White, R. S. Moore and Dr. C. V. Fisher. There is a vacancy existing in the board at present because of the removal from Klamath county of Alex. Martin, Jr., which will be filled by the appointment of his successor by Judge H. L. Benson, to whom this authority is delegated by the statutes.

Members of the park board and the mayor have been anxious for some

time to secure desirable property for park purposes, to begin the formation of a park system. While it is hoped to secure some larger areas further out, it is also desirable that a number of small parks may be had in various portions of the town for neighborhood playgrounds and breathing spots that will be better appreciated with development of city conditions brought by larger population. Other propositions are being sought, but the limited means at the command of the board make it difficult to progress rapidly. Members of the board state that another project is now under consideration which it is hoped may be matured at an early date.

STOLE TURKEYS IS CHARGE MADE

John Corey and John Cooper were arrested last night by the police, charged with stealing twelve turkeys from J. W. Frey, who conducts a shooting gallery on Main street, and selling them. The proprietor of Jackson's restaurant and of the Mountain cafe told the police that they each purchased two turkeys from Cooper yesterday, and Cooper admits selling the fowls.

The men were turned over to the sheriff's office last night, and Corey was released on his own recognisance. Cooper was kept in jail over night. A complaint, charging the men with stealing turkeys was sworn to by Frey before Justice of the Peace Graves this afternoon.
