SCORCHING TAXI KILLS AND MAIMS

TAXICAB CREATES PANIC ON A BRIDGE IN VANCOUVER B. C. AFTER RUNNING DOWN TWO, MACHINE ESCAPES

VANCOUVER, B.C., Jan. 14—John Longman was killed and John McPherson fatally injured when they were struck by a taxicab on the Granville street bridge this morning. The machine started across the bridge at a high rate of speed, and the two men were unable to get out of the way.

Eye witnesses state that the chauffeur made no attempt to slacken the speed of the car after the accident, and that the car traveled faster, if anything, after the mishap. In the confusion the number of the car was not noted.

"BIG CINDER" IS TAKEN OFF TRAIN

JACK JOHNSON ARRESTED AT BATTLE CREEK ON ADVICES FROM FEDERAL AUTHORITIES IN CHICAGO

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Jan. 14.—Jack Johnson and his white wife were removed from a train today by the local police at the request of Chicago federal authorities. They will be detained until the arrival of officers from Chicago.

It was learned this morning that the negro heavyweight was on his way to Toronto, and it was feared that he might forfeit his bond in the white slavery case.

Johnson protested that he intended to remain in Canada only a few days. Johnson, his white wife and his valet were taken to the home of a policeman to await the arrival of a Chicago federal officer.

When the dusky champion gave \$20,000 bonds for his appearance he agreed not to leave Illinois. The negro explained that he was on his way to Toronto to see Tom Flanagan, his former manager, regarding an offer made for a bout between himself and Falder in Paris.

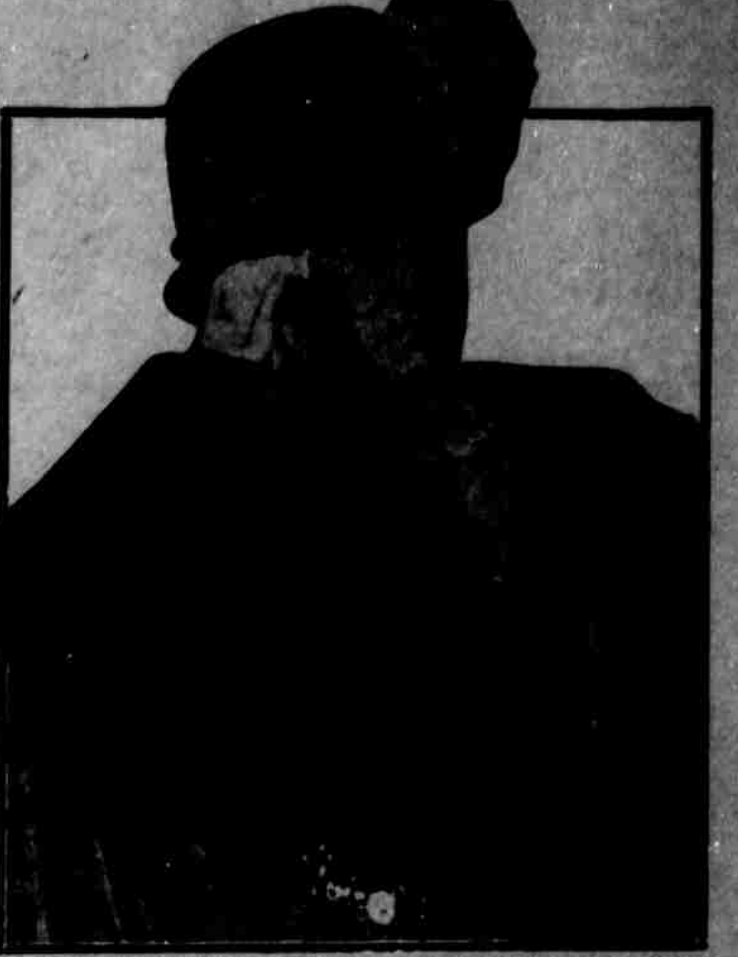

OREGON CAUSE

VALLEY PEOPLE ARE INTERESTED OVER THE PROSPECT OF THE COMPLETION OF THE OREGON & PACIFIC RAILROAD. IN THE LAST PART OF THE INTERPRETATION THE FOLLOWING CONCERNING THE NEW ROAD ARE GIVEN:

1.—The Oregon Eastern will be established by 1912.

2.—It will be a main line through the mountains between Portland and Eugene, and will give a direct route through traffic, freight and passenger, to the Oregon Eastern station (O. W. R. & N.) from Portland to the station (12 miles east of Vale) on the north and the station on the south.

3.—The valley between the Oregon Eastern will be a main line of Oregon, in the northern part of the valley.

4.—Vale will be made a "class point," supply and service, and will be a main line of the valley.

5.—Beyond Crescent, the main route, new building, will be used for through traffic, northward through Eugene to Portland and Seattle, and southward via Klamath Falls to San Francisco.

6.—Extension of the railroad line built up the Deschutes will be made to Crescent, where a general freight will be established.

7.—Through traffic between the Pacific and Portland will be diverted over the main line, and that portion of the Southern Railway (Marion) which now runs to a main line, on which are located, Eugene, Grand Falls and Madras, will be relegated to local usage only in the main line from Washington, Idaho, California and Portland will be kept on the main line, and will be a main line of the valley.

8.—Interstate traffic between San Francisco and Spokane will go via the Northern cutoff to Coquille, thence down the Deschutes via Hood, following the present routing up the Columbia River after reaching Vancouver Junction, 19 miles east of The Dalles.

9.—Spokane and Hamilton and both points, as well as Coquille, east of the Pacific, will be reached via Vale, at first over existing O. W. R. & N. line to Pendleton, Idaho, and later by way of the P. L. & N. connecting northwest to Lewiston, or up the Columbia River to Idaho, or via the proposed main line of railroad across east of the coast in the latter part of the year.

10.—Vale is here to stay, and will be the principal railway station point on the main line of the valley, and an important station on the main line, and equal division point for the through traffic.
