

# ELISOR ACTS IN CORONER'S PLACE

ASSIGNOR OF WHITLOCK FROM THE CITY RESULTS IN JUDGE HENSON'S APPOINTMENT SERVING PAPERS ON THE SHERIFF

Because the coroner was not in the city, Judge Henson late Thursday afternoon appointed Bailiff Morgan clerk to serve a complaint on Sheriff Low in the suit which E. S. Grigby started to compel the sheriff, as tax collector, to accept county warrants in payment of taxes to the amount of 11.6 mills.

Considerable amusement was caused today by the publication of a story in the morning paper to the effect that the story was part of a conspiracy in a fight against the county court. As a matter of fact, the case was started simply to settle a vexing point of law on which attorneys do not agree.

The intimation that the Weyerhaeuser Timber company is behind the suit is treated as a poor joke, especially as the timber company does not now own, so far as can be ascertained, never has paid or tried to pay county taxes with county warrants.

It is argued that if the mandamus proceedings are continued and the courts hold that county warrants may be used in the payment in full of taxes, there will be a tendency to making county warrants more valuable, and there will not be any loss to the county.

# MASONS WERE TO COST \$30,000

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Dollars shall have been subscribed by the undersigned:

Second—That one-fourth (1/4) of the sum so subscribed herewith by the undersigned severally shall be due and payable at the time Klamath Lodge No. 77, A. F. & A. M., shall designate the city lot which in their judgment it is desirable to purchase for the purposes of the herewith subscription, and shall thereafter appoint a building committee with full power to act in the premises; that the above sum and each of the installments hereinafter designated shall be payable to the said building committee or to any person, association or corporation that the said building committee may by resolution direct. 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gave him an order. Finished writing, he handed me the filled-in blank, and told me to sign on the bottom.

"I looked over the sheet and noticed that about two inches from the bottom was a perforation. The wording below that constituted a negotiable note, and made no reference to the trees to be delivered. It read something like: 'Pay to the order of for value received, etc.' and had cashed it.

"I asked him what he thought I was. He laughed and said 'I didn't think you would sign it.' I tore off the sheet below the perforation and wrote in a sentence calling for collection on delivery of the trees. Since then I have heard of neither White nor the trees."

"None of the victims of Emile had heard from him today—and neither had the police."

Coming to Klamath Falls early in 1911, Emile leased a tract of land near the city, and established the "Klamath Falls Nursery." He advertised extensively in the Klamath Falls papers, and made a thorough canvass of the town, and upon the strength of his big orders he secured financial assistance from local business men. The trees he brought were not at all satisfactory, and many refused to pay for them.

After operating several months Emile started to leave, stating that he was going to Dorris to see about a shipment of trees held up there, but he was taken from the train at the instance of a local business house. He was indignant at this treatment, and paid the firm, vowing to trade no more with them. He evidently included every other business here in his vow, as he departed within a few days.

(Bulletin) MEXICO CITY, Feb. 14.—After an hour of intermittent firing, the real battle of the day started in earnest at 6:50.

The casualties of yesterday's fighting are estimated to be 1,000 killed and 2,000 wounded.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 14.—Fighting was resumed this morning. The federals expected to surprise the rebels in the arsenal, and charged, firing as they advanced. The rebel fire decimated them.

Daylight showed that Madero had moved his heavy guns directly in front of the deserted American consulate, apparently inviting its destruction.

Diaz gained yesterday, and it is expected that he will keep the Madero forces on the defensive today.

the county clerk. It is an increase of \$100 annually in the salary of the assessor, \$200 for the school superintendent, \$100 for the treasurer and \$400 for the county judge.

The sheriff now receives \$2,000 annually, but is required to pay his own traveling expenses in the county. The new bill allows him traveling expenses, so the remuneration will be practically the same.

The bill will now go to the senate.
