WEEKLY SERMON

The Golden Calf

Rev. J. S. Stubblefield, Pastor First P. rebyterian Church

Text—Exodus 32:1-34.

The instinct to worship is constitutional in man. He may worship an invisible God. The sun, moon and stars, a reptile, a bird, an ox or a golden calf. The motive that moves man to worship may be fear; it may be a feeling of need or it may be a desire to express his gratitude to his creator.

The Hebrews were in the wilderness. Moses, their leader, had gone up into the mountains to commune with Jehovah. Moses was gone longer than they expected him to be. They said they did not know what had become of him. They felt very lonely because of the need of some superhuman help. They wanted to move, but did not know which way to go. They were impatient. They really wanted a change of rulers. They said to Aaron: "Let us make gods which shall go before us." Aaron took the golden earrings which they brought and made a golden calf for them to worship.

These Hebrews were not so very different from men of today. They had the same worshipful instinct. When they were in deep need they looked for superhuman help. They were not very well acquainted with Jehovah, so they naturally turned to the gods. They had seen their masters worship, and had no doubt themselves worshipped in Egypt. The time comes to most of us sooner or later when we feel the need of divine help. It may not strike us with much

force until we find ourselves standing on the crumbling edge of eternity, or see some one very dear to us standing there and realize our inability to give any help. To whom, then, shall we turn, if we know not the true God? To a golden calf?

When Moses spoke to Aaron about his folly Aaron attempted to excuse himself by putting the blame partly upon Providence and partly upon the people. The truth of the matter is that Aaron did not have backbone enough to stand up for what he knew to be right when the people were against him. Aaron said the people compelled him to make the golden calf. There used to be a lot of large shippers who got rebates from the railroads. One shipper said he knew it was not right, but his competitors all did, and thus compelled him to. There are a great many politicians who do things which are not right, but they have the same excuse that Aaron had, the people compel them to. Many big business men in the East who are paying the girls they employ an impossible wage, say they hate to do it, but they are compelled to. Many people do things in society of which they do not approve themselves, but they say social customs compel them to.

Here in Klamath Falls we need something to make us free, so that we shall not be compelled to do things which we know we ought not to do. Precisely this is what Christianity is for. He that is free in Christ is free indeed.
