stand there against some of his form-  
er friends in the army who he fears  
will turn on him. The castle is al-  
most a Gibraltar, rising high on a  
rocky prominence two miles south-  
west of the Helen gate to the city.  
Since Huerta gave her first recep-  
tion in the castle November 18th,  
prior to this time the dictator's fam-  
ily had lived in their old home. Hu-  
erta himself spent most of his time at  
the national palace.

This move bears out the rumors  
that relations between General Aure-  
liano Blanquet, chief supporter of  
Huerta, and himself, have become  
strained. There is a belief in Mexico  
City that Blanquet is waiting for an  
opportunity to seize power, through  
his command of the army, and throw-  
out the man he helped to the presi-  
dency.

The falling of both Jaures and Vic-  
torio into the hands of the Constitu-  
cionalistas has struck another heavy  
blow to Huerta's prestige.  
If through a coup d'etat, one of  
these famous Mexican happenings,  
General Blanquet with the aid of the  
army, should overthrow Huerta and  
assume the provisional presidency,  
the Mexican situation will be more  
complicated than ever for Blanquet  
is of the same type as Huerta.

There is strong belief that a block-  
ade of all Mexican ports will be or-  
dered within a few days by President  
Wilson. This would result in the  
cutting off of all army supplies.
