Passion Play in Mexico Has Entirely Un-Biblical Close

Instead of Portraying the Death for Mankind as in Holy Writ Man Playing Role of Savior Descends From Cross and Attacks Rabble

MEXICO CITY, April 23.—Three Mexicans were hanging upon crosses, tied with ropes, in a small interior town, at Easter time, two years ago. It was the annual passion play of the village, and the citizens were gathered around the crosses, lamenting over the dying Christ, who was personified by the man on the middle cross, and cursing, in real round oaths, the two thieves who were hung on either side. The Mexicans, in the story of the two thieves, do not understand the moral of Christ offering redemption to the outcast pair at the last moment. Instead, they believe that the thieves were placed beside Christ to make his death the more ignominious. And so, in all village passion plays, the thieves come in for a vast amount of execration. In this particular instance the crowd, in its hatred of the thieves, got into a white-hot revival heat against the thieves, and one Mexican, a little drunker than the rest, suddenly shouted: "Rateros, rateros," meaning "thieves, thieves," and dashed off from the crowd with a stick which he jabbed into the ribs of the innocent actor on the cross.

"Let me alone," shouted the tied-up actor. "I am only acting. I am Juan Lopez, and you know me well." His voice could not be heard above the clamor. The excited crowd only cheered on the man with the stick, who gave the actor another thrust. The other thief began to shout for the police, and the actor impersonating Christ joined in the declaration of the now-injured "thief" that they were only acting. After another thrust or two the "thief" fainted, and when the crowd saw that he had really been injured it quieted down enough so that the voice of the actor impersonating the Christ could be heard: "Fools!" he shouted. "You have killed him. Let me down. I will not be the Christ any longer." He was untied, and the first thing he did when he got to the ground was to give a sound beating to the man with the stick. In the meantime the unconscious actor was taken down from the cross and removed to the village doctor's office. Two weeks in bed was the penalty he paid for his realistic acting. There hasn't been an Easter passion play in this village for the past

two years, for the simple reason that no one is willing to take the part of the thief. The childishness of the Mexican Indian—and there are 12,000,000 of him in Mexico, as against 4,000,000 real Mexicans—is illustrated at Easter time, by the manner in which he understands the Easter story. His whole idea is not to mourn the death of Christ so much as to express his hatred of the men who brought it about. Good Friday, which in other lands is a day of mourning, is given over, by the Mexican, to showing his hatred of Judas. Many thousands of tissue paper figures of Judas are sold in the cities and villages. These effigies are "lynched" in the village street, with great shouting and jeers. Then, for hours afterwards, men and boys throw sticks and stones at the effigies until they are torn to bits. In the camps of all the soldiers Friday and Saturday before Easter, whether the soldiers were rebels or federals, it is safe to say that fighting was forgotten for a space of time, in order to give the Mexican an opportunity to give vent to hatred of Judas Iscariot.

Marrying Without Preparation

In the May American Magazine a contributor begins "A Husband's Story"—the personal history of a man who has had twenty-five years of married life. This series of articles is to be a careful and truthful record of the trials and perils of marriage as well as the successes, reported by a man who has been married twenty-five years. The following extract from the first chapter shows how he rushed into marriage: "I went to see the girl many times during the early summer, and we were happy in our planning for the future. Our talk was valueless. We did not even discuss financial arrangements. It was a very happy period, all dreams and unrealities. The only definite plan was that I was to work hard for a year after we were married, and then start in business for myself. She was first to go to Europe with her mother (the mother planning this, because at such times her husband was willing to spend money), buy the trousseau and return in October. Then there was to be a great church wedding. We discussed details of dress, ushers, bridesmaids and best men—and did not mention whether we would take an apartment or board. The subject of children was never mentioned. "Our ignorance, in view of later acquired wisdom, was appalling. Two persons, ignorant of the commonest requirements of family life, ignorant of duties, expense, health, neither thinking of nor understanding the duties of fatherhood and motherhood, were rushing into wedlock. We were almost strangers to each other; taking each other on faith. We loved each other; and it was sufficient for the moment. Whether or not it was sufficient you may judge later. I marvel often over that, and give thanks that it turned out as well as it did. "In mid-summer she came through our city, stopping over for a day or two with a girl friend. It was to be our farewell before her start for Europe, and we dreaded even two months' separation. That evening we talked over the plans for our wedding and spoke of our dislike for the or-

deal of a church wedding. Europe seemed a long way and two months an age. I suggested that we be married at once, avoid the trip to Europe and the church ceremony, and she assented, more from dread of the parting, I think, than from desire to marry me immediately. "In my own defense I plead ignorance. I did not understand then the sacrifice I was asking her to make, nor fully what such a move may mean. I realized dimly that the move was not a wise one. My 'horse sense' came to the rescue, and I feared for her the consequences of a hasty marriage. I told her, as gently as possible, that to wed in that manner invited criticism and gossip, and that I wanted to shield her against them. Not knowing the world as well even as I did, she was hurt, and imagined that in some way I was unwilling to carry out my proposal. "I tried to explain that my hesitation was all for her sake, and she said she did not care what anyone said. "The following day the mother gave her consent, and within two hours after receiving her letter and blessing we stood in the presence of a minister and exchanged the vows that made us man and wife."

Declaring the Intention of the City of Klamath Falls to Improve Eleventh Street in Said City From Main Street to Upham Street, Worden Avenue From Upham to Donald, and Donald Street From Worden Avenue to Sargent Street

Whereas, A petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and filed with the Police Judge thereof, and presented to the Common Council, having for its object the improvement of Eleventh street in said city from Main street to Upham street, Worden avenue from Upham street to Donald street; Donald street from Worden avenue to Sargent street, including all the intersections of said streets;

And, Whereas, The Common Council has directed the city engineer to survey the said streets and prepare plans and specifications and estimates of cost of various kinds of improvements of the said streets, and the said city engineer having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of members of the Common Council plans and specifications and estimates of cost of the several varieties of improvement;

And, Whereas, The said plans and specifications and estimates are found satisfactory after examination by the council;

Be It Resolved, That the said plans and specifications are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby expresses its determination to improve the said streets within the limits defined by grading the same and improving with oil macadam pavement with a 4-inch Water Macadam base and a 3-inch Asphalt Macadam top, with concrete curb and gutter as per plans and specifications on file, together with the necessary drainage. The width of roadway to be 24 feet.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the city engineer covering the proposed work are to be used as a basis for the said work, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such work and improvement as submitted by said engineer at \$18,779.75, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of the said work.

And it is further resolved, That the time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against the proposed improvement shall be on or before the 11th day of May, 1914.
