

MOVIE PICTURES

With the house crowded to the doors, the Orpheus theater last night exhibited "The Battle of Gettysburg," and never since the opening of this play house has a production received the enthusiastic reception and comment accorded this. The five reels are crowded with thrills and the interest is intense from the announcement to Lincoln's Gettysburg address, which ends the picture.

History is closely followed in making this an instructive as well as an entertaining offering. The picture will be shown for the last time tonight.

There was, perhaps, no more interested spectator in the theater than Col. M. G. Wilkins, who fought with others for the "lost cause," which had its northern invasion plans wrecked by this terrible three day struggle. The Colonel was able to follow the course of the battle clearly, and he states that this is as near a perfect reproduction as it would be possible to make in motion pictures, allowing for the spectacular.

There were highly pleased audiences leaving the Star theater Saturday and Sunday, for as a real, gripping photoplay production, Hoarworth's seven reel rendition of "The Sea

Wolf" has few equals. The same breathless interest that has held those reading London's famous book (from which the photoplay is taken) holds the audience intent throughout the seven reels. All at the same time loathe and admire the dominant character, "Wolf Larsen," which is ably portrayed, and the scenes were carried out throughout the book with red-blooded reality, opening to many eyes one seamy side of life they never dreamed of.

The hard, dangerous life of the Arctic sealer—mostly a poacher—is such that it brings out all of the primitive animal in man, and the desire for the finer things are lost. It is a career where strength reigns, and to see one man, by his powerful strength, hold completely cowed an entire ship's crew, was one of the thrills. The film maker could have brought out more of the man's other side—that of an eager student—and have added much to the appreciation of London's most famous character, as outlined in the book. The feature film is here to stay, though, and every exhibition was to a crowded house.

Those who are following "The Perils of Pauline," the \$25,000 movie serial at the Star, must attend tonight, as the present interesting episode will be shown tonight only.

Tomorrow night the Foster Stock company will open a week's engagement at the Star. The opening bill is "Lonesome Trail," and among others to be presented are "Brown's in

town" and "The Barrier." There will be no change in prices, and movies will be shown between acts.

War pictures more up to date than the "Gettysburg" film are to be shown weekly at the Orpheus, beginning at an early date, for Manager Tindall has made arrangements with the Strand theater in New York to furnish film right from where the fight is on in Europe. The Strand is an English-controlled establishment, and the war pictures are being taken at the front by English movie operators.

Brussels a Huge Hospital

Hotels Refuse Pay Guests; Homes Take in Wounded

hundred beds fitted up for soldiers in her own mansion. Provision has been made in one place and another for 50,000 wounded." Miss Findlay, who has many influential friends in the city, was permitted to make a tour of the Hospital de Saint Jean, the largest of the Brussels hospitals, and also of the Louvain hospital, where Dr. Leon Baroleo, brother of the author of the much discussed book on the Anglo-German problem, is in charge. She talked with some of the soldiers, and heard many vivid narratives of the fighting around Liege from their own lips.

The Belgian soldiers spoke with great indignation of the conduct of the Germans in bayonetting Belgian wounded," said Miss Findlay. One soldier told her he had not believed the Germans capable of this, but had witnessed their barbarity with his own eyes. He was one of a party of 150 who had been surrounded by Germans at Wareme, quite near to Liege.

"A small Belgian force found itself suddenly confronted by a large body of Germans, and when the order was given to retire this company of 150 men was cut off. This man was wounded, and his leg was broken. As

he lay on the ground he saw the Germans bayonetting his comrades who had fallen. He heard his commanding officer appeal for mercy for his wounded men, but this was ignored. The officer himself was shot. When expecting death every moment the soldier was lifted to his horse by some comrades who were escaping, and six of them—the sole survivors of 150—galloped back to the fort.

"I saw at Louvain one very pathetic case. The man was a Belgian advocate, who had been shot by a sentry by mistake. The sentry called to him to halt, and the advocate mistook the command for pass, and went on. He was instantly shot, and I was told he was dying."

Miss Findlay elicited from some of the men an account of their sensation when fighting.

"The worst moment," said one, "is when you are lying, waiting and listening, and you hear the concussion, jarring noise of the mitrailleuse—that is what tries the nerves—the waiting. When one is actually fighting one feels nothing—one just goes on fighting."
