War Draft Questions And Answers; Official

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29, 1917.

Among the many questions asked every day at the office of the Adjutant General regarding requirements of the war census, to be held Tuesday, June 5, the following are typical:

1. "I am a man 30 years old. I will be 31 on June 20. Do I have to register on War Census Day?"

The answer is, Yes. Every male resident between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, must register.

In other words, every man who has passed his 21st birthday and has not passed his 31st birthday, must register.

If a man's 31st birthday should fall on June 5, the date of the war census, he is then 31 years old and not subject to registration. If he is 31 years old the next day, June 6, then he must register.

2. "I am a British subject, 28 years old. I tried to enlist in the Oregon National Guard, but was rejected on

account of poor physical condition. Do I have to register?"

Yes. All male residents between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, must register under penalty of imprisonment. This includes aliens of any nationality, Japanese, Chinese, British, Germans, Austrians, Mexican or otherwise. One purpose of the war census is to obtain data as to the number and occupation of all aliens of military age. An alien, of course, will not be subject to military service, but he must register.

3. "Does a man who will be 21 years old the day before War Census Day have to register?"

Yes. And if he is 21 years old on War Census Day itself, he must register. If he is not 21 years old until June 6, he does not have to register.

4. "My age is 39 years and I am a farmer. Am I subject to penalty if I do not register?"

No. Only male residents between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, are subject to registration.

KLAMATH BOYS FRIENDS OF COOK

LETTER RECEIVED BY MR. AND

MRS. C. F. STONE FROM JOE SKELTON OF AERO FORCE IN TEXAS.

Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Stone have received the following letter from Joe Skelton: formerly of this city who enlisted from the University of Oregon.

SAN ANTONIO, May 22, 1917—Well, I'm doing a little soldiering stunt in Texas now, but I don't know how long I'll be here. We are drilling every day and it isn't bad at all, as we have a peach of a top sergeant.

There are over 3,500 men in this camp and we all live in tents. I am living in the same tent with Louie Hoagland, Ray Peters, Bill Weeks and Everett McCollum, all from Klamath. When we have a bum supper we slip over to the cook shack where Curley Bania, another Klamath boy cooks and he gives us a handout. He says any time any of the Klamath boys are hungry all they have to do is to come around. Night before last he fried a couple dozen eggs for us and you ought to have seen the five of us pile into them. Last night he gave us wieners.

A bunch got in from San Francisco a few days ago and Bud Bittinger was among them. There are quite a lot of Klamath fellows around camp and they generally congregate in our tent

so we manage to have a pretty good time, but just the same all the boys are ready to move again, and all want to go to France, and I should not be surprised if we get a chance.

The whole company went swimming this afternoon in the river and even if it was a little muddy, it was wet and felt pretty good, as the thermometer registered about 100 in the shade and there was no shade.

One can look up most any time during the day and see aeroplanes tumbling around in the air, but a fellow does not get any flying until he is assigned to a crew and the Lord only knows when that will be.

We are about five miles from San Antonio and can go over in the evening if we get back before twelve. Louie and I went over the other night and looked the place over. There are ten or fifteen thousand soldiers around that town and every time anything happens it is laid to a soldier. And maybe they are right. One soldier cleaned up three or four Mexicans with a pair of brass knucks the other night, and he was picked up by the military police.
