KLAMATH MAN SUPPLIES STOCK

W. F. SIMS, OF MERRILL DISTRICT SAYS HE WILL HAVE NERO AND THAT WHITE CLOUD IS TO BE AT MONTAGUE.

Will F. Sims, of the Merrill district, announced today that he has the contract for supplying 50 head of horses and mules for the Montague Round-Up July 2, 4 and 5.

Mr. Sims also announced that the Montague Round-Up Association has bought the famous white horse, White Cloud, an outlaw of the Wagon Tire Mountain district which has never been ridden and has been the property of J. Frank Adams of this city. This horse will be taken to the show.

Sims also says that he is the sole owner of Nero, for on whose back anyone is offered \$50 to stay one minute.

Sims says that both these animals will be at Montague despite the fact that another July 4 show has announced it will have Nero.

He also said that Love Chandler is going to Montague to ride White Cloud, the name of the never ridden outlaw.

He says the show is attracting attention from all parts of Eastern Oregon. Sims furnished horses for the Ashland show last year.

JURY FAILS TO REACH A VERDICT

CASE OF STATE AGAINST JESS MILLETT ARRESTED WITH BOOZE IN CAR HUNG BY JURY LAST NIGHT.

A jury was unable to come to an agreement in the case of the State against Jess Millett charged with having liquor in his possession and one of the men arrested by the sheriff and

officer one week ago Sunday night on the Davis road.

The evidence in the case consists of four large demijohns and a sack containing a number of bottles of liquor which were found in the car by the officers. Other passengers in Millett's car who were also arrested have pleaded guilty and received their fines.

The case was heard in the justice court last night and the jury was not dismissed by Justice Gowen until 3 a. m. The members of the jury were: O. L. Carter, W. C. Townsend, Alex Naylor, John Brett, John Hamilton and Percy Evans.

PROPER FLAG DISPLAY ON MAY 30

The following clause is from the United States army regulations and indicates the proper use of the American flag on Memorial day:

"On Memorial day, May 30, at all army posts and stations the national flag will be displayed at half mast from sunrise until midday, and immediately before noon the band or field music will play some appropriate air, and the national salute of twenty-one guns will be fired at 12 m. at all posts and stations provided with artillery.

"At the conclusion of this memorial tribute at noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and will remain there until sunset.

"When hoisted to the top of the staff the flag will be saluted by playing one or more appropriate patriotic airs. In this way fitting testimonial of respect for the heroic dead and honor to their patriotic devotion will be appropriately rendered."
