

### WILSON TELLS OF FOOD MEASURES

WTRPN INTO FIGHT TO QNT THK NIGHT BILL. PANMED — SAYS BMBR AND WINKS SHOULD NOT BK STUTTED NOW

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 26.—President Wilson stepped into the prohibition fight today over the food bill, partly to save the measure from the row between contending factions, and partly to get the law he believes the nation will approve passed by congress.

He told the senate leaders today that he agreed with the proposal to stop the manufacture of food stuffs into whiskey and gin, but did not believe the brewing of beer or the manufacture of light wines should be stopped now.

ARIZLAND, July 2.—Cowboys here to ride at the Regue River Round-Up July 2, 4 and 5, are considering organizing a troop of cavalry and offering their services to the government. ### Lack of Cargo Ships Causes Coast Oil Crisis

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2.—Lack of a sufficient number of purely cargo bottoms, and the East's supposed misunderstanding of Western conditions, are two elements that have created an oil shortage in the West, according to oil experts here.

The oil experts make this explanation as their view of the real reasons for the threatened crippling of Western industries, due to a lack of fuel oil. The bottoms, they declare, are needed to bring the oil out of Mexico, for that country, in their opinion, can supply the oil needs of all Europe, and a good part of this country indefinitely. To bring this oil out of Mexico by rail is prohibitive, they say. Ships are the only salvation, and there are not enough ships to supply the European demand alone.

There is a scarcity of supply, but no potential shortage, these oil men contend. And they believe that if congress opened to development, these experts assert, the state's oil reserve, which has shrunk from over 50,000,000 barrels to approximately 30,000,000 in three years, will be entirely wiped out in a few more years, and there will be a general industrial paralysis, despite the fact that the conditions of thousands of acres of proven but undeveloped oil lands will still obtain.

The Southern Pacific company had announced that it is facing a crisis, not because of any real oil shortages, but because its 100,000

acres of oil lands in the Midway district are tied up from complete development by litigation. The company is supplying itself only from the wells it is allowed to operate in this district.

So far as it knows there are no laws that will allow for the leasing of patents on these lands. In brief, the government, now that it has these lands in its possession, has no machinery to bestow them upon prospective operators, as the old placer mining laws under which they were first located are now inoperative.

The question will be solved, these oil men declare, when congress sees the necessity of passing laws opening these lands to development.
