WASHINGTON, D. C., July 12.—Persistent inquiries from all parts of the country for information about method to be followed in selecting men for national army has caused the officials to explain that the president's determination to have absolute fairness govern its progress was responsible for the decision to withhold announcement of the plan until the eve of the drawing.

The drawing will occur here. Baker will probably draw the first number. Only twenty-one states have reported the completion of the draft organization.

GERMAN PIGS DISAPPEAR

AMSTERDAM, July 12.—Five and a half million pigs have mysteriously disappeared in Germany in six months.

According to a memorial laid before the war food bureau by the progressive people's party, 13,000,000 swine were actually slaughtered in the half year between September 1, 1918, and March 1, 1917, whereas officially controlled slaughterers in that period only show a total of 7,500,000.
