GERMANS TO WAIT UNTIL NEXT SPRING

TOO LATE FOR FURTHER ADVANCE THIS YEAR

Military Circles in Germany Consider That Capture of Naval Bases of Riga Virtually Ends Operations on Riga Front—Advance Would Require Building New Roads, Which Would Be Impossible in Winter.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 8.—Leading German military circles consider with the capture of important naval bases of Riga and Duo Namuenda, that operations on the Riga front are virtually ended for this year.

A further advance would require the building of new roads and the establishment of supply depots, which practically would be impossible after the winter season in Russia begins.
