# Whiskey Manufacture Ceased Last Night

## Millions of Bushels of Grain Which Food Officials Say Would Otherwise Be Ground Up for Whiskey Will Now Be Released to the People for Food

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 10.—Manufacture of whiskey ceased throughout the nation at 11 o'clock last night, when the prohibitive clause of the food control act became effective. Millions of bushels of grain which food officials say would otherwise be released for food. How many millions, no one knows, for the manufacture of alcohol for beverage purposes is so closely blended with the production of alcohol for industrial and medicinal purposes that there is no way of determining the exact amount.

Of the 100,000,000 bushels of grain, or thereabouts, which goes into the distilleries each year, about 40 per cent, experts estimate, comes out in the form of whiskey and other distilled beverages. The remainder, made into alcohol of exactly the same characteristics as that used for whiskey, eventually finds its way into perfumes, toilet waters, bay rum, medicines and to industries where denatured alcohol is used in ever increasing quantities.

Approximately 116,000,000 gallons of whiskey are produced each year by American distilleries. Production of alcohol by the same distilleries for commercial and medicinal uses other than beverages approximates 146,000,000 gallons. The manufacture of alcohol for the latter purpose will continue as usual, probably in greater volume, and few of the large distilleries, if any, will have to shut down, according to government authorities. The class of distilleries which will be put out of business is composed almost wholly of small plants operated by from one man to half a dozen, located in California, Ohio and New Jersey, and producing brandy from grapes, apples and peaches. These produce approximately 2,000,000 a

year. Those in New Jersey and Ohio, officials believe, will suspend business. The California distilleries, it is thought, will continue to operate in part for the manufacture of spirits for fortifying sweet wine.

Stopping whiskey manufacture, instead of curtailing the government revenues, will increase them for the next two years, officials believe. Coupled with the pending revenue bill, the withdrawal of whiskey from circulation, the revenue bill would impose a tax of \$1.10, and the revenue bill contemplates a tax of \$3.20 a gallon. A stock of approximately 230,000,000 gallons has accumulated in the bonded warehouses and on the shelves of wholesale and retail liquor dealers. Approximately 190,000,000 gallons are in warehouses, and upon that quantity the government will collect taxes upon alcohol for commercial purposes, except alcohol for denaturation will probably treble the revenue a tax of \$2.20, doubling the present income. There are approximately 700 distilleries in the country, of which more than half are small fruit brandy plants. The amount of capital invested in the latter class is not great in the aggregate. The capital invested in the big producing plants mounts high into the millions. Officials here believe that losses will be more than wiped out by the prices distilleries will obtain for product already manufactured. In the opinion of some officials whiskey will be selling at \$15 a gallon within twelve months, affording distillers enormous profits.

A tremendous growth in the use of commercial alcohol is anticipated, which in time may result in the demand for a quantity of alcohol at least as large as the present output for all purposes.

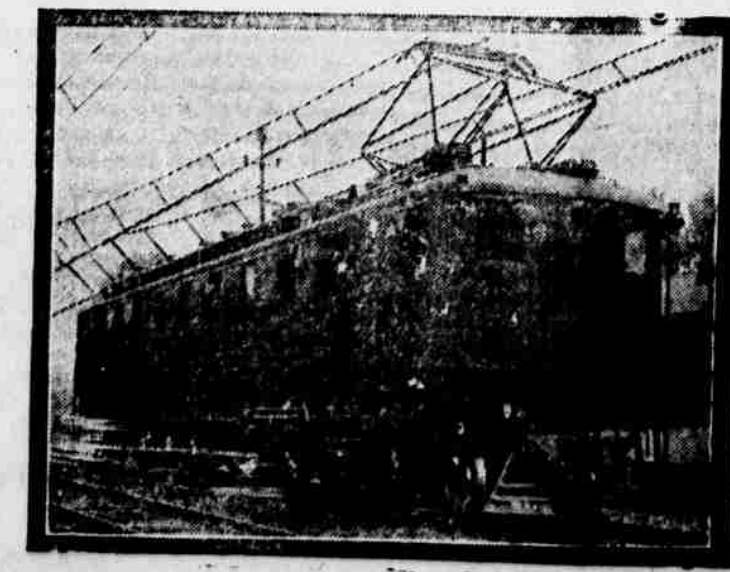
# Domestic Science to Aid Food Administrator

hired traitors in America, hired and paid for by German money. "These traitors have conveyed the idea that American labor is against the war, and for a separate peace in Russia," the statement continues. "Russian labor thought it heard the voice of American labor, and instigated a counter revolution. The Russian divisions and regiments that have abandoned the field of battle did so because of the reports that reached them from the traitors in America. This must cease. The masks of these traitors must be stripped from their faces.

"For this purpose, a mass meeting will be held here September 15th, at which Charles Edward Russell, a member of the American mission to Russia, Samuel Gompers and others will report to the American people on the consternation caused in Russia by the work perpetrated in America by these traitors." The speakers, it was announced, will voice "the disgust and loathing of the wily machinations of the Kaiser's tools, the sense of loyalty which actuates every true American in contemplating the debacle of Europe. "The malicious falsehoods spread by the so-called People's and Workmen's councils will be nailed to the mast. The instructions against the American labor movement will be recalled by labor's only spokesman, American labor is loyal to the needs of the nation; loyal to its war purposes in aiming a death blow at imperialism and Prussianism—loyal to its allies. Organized labor will seize this opportunity to learn the truth from the lips of its representatives and exhibit its devotion."
